

FOREWORD.



N reviewing the activities of the "Old Stocktonians" for the past year, we can unreservedly congratulate the Committee on the amount and the excellence of the work which they have so willingly done to further the interests of the Association. If the results have not in every case justified their highest hopes, we can assure them that their work was well and truly done, and, after all, a condition of self-

satisfaction is rather a dangerous state for any man or Association to be in.

Perhaps the outstanding event of the year has been the retirement of J. J. PREST, Esq., B.Sc., from the Headmastership of the School and, in consequence, from his position as President of the "Old Stocktonians." Mr. Prest has been Headmaster of the Secondary School for 27 years, and President of our Association since its formation. To mark the occasion of his retirement, the "Old Stocktonians," in conjunction with the Old Girls' Association, the present scholars and staff, and the Governors of the School, made a presentation to him in the Jubilee Hall, on July 23rd. The large hall was crowded with an admirably representative gathering, assembled to pay the tribute of respect to Mr. Prest. After a short musical programme, speeches of appreciation were made by R. Roger, Esq., J.P. (Chairman), Messrs. Taylor (Staff), Pickworth ("Old Stocktonians"), Hawley (Present Scholars), Ald. F. T. Nattrass (Governors), and Miss Funnell (O.G.A.). The President of the "Old Stocktonians" (Mr. L. T. Winn) then presented to Mr. Prest, a silver rose bowl, a book containing the names of all subscribers, and a cheque. Mr. Prest, in the speech of the evening, emphasised the happy side of his life experience, and told us of the pleasure it had always given him to trace first the progress of the opening mind of his pupils, and later to learn of the material success and the development of character of those who had been placed under his care at so important a period of their lives.

The evening undoubtedly deepened the warm feelings of personal regard which have always existed between the "Old Stocktonians" and their President. The Committee feel that they are by no means "done with" Mr. Prest. He has been elected an Honorary President of the Association, and we wish to assure him that our regard for him has steadily increased, and we trust that his interest in us will not diminish.

We refuse to believe that we are losing an old friend, but we have a confident hope that we are gaining a new one. We extend a most cordial welcome to Mr. T. Crockett, M.A., the new Headmaster of our old school, who becomes joint-President of the "Old Stocktonians." At the time of writing most of us have not yet met Mr. Crockett, but on those who have done so he has already made an excellent impression. He, on his side, has

yet to make acquaintance with us, and we trust, and confidently believe, that with knowledge will come mutual liking and esteem. To Mr. Crockett, then, we extend a very warm welcome, and can promise him that loyalty which as headmaster of our old school he has every right to expect.

The remaining activities of the past year include the Dinner, the "big" Lecture, three "small" Lectures, a Concert, and a number of Smokers.

The Annual Dinner was held at the Queen's Hotel, on Friday, Dec. 22nd. Our old friend Robt. Roger, Esq., J.P., Chairman of the Governors, was his usual genial self as Chairman. Fifty-nine "Old Stocktonians" were present and an excellent dinner was followed by an informal social evening. Musical items were rendered by Messrs. W. Hewitt, L. Pringle, H. T. Sherwood and N. Rogers (Secretary). The Chairman's address was responded to by Mr. E. Scholes, first President of the Association. With the toast of "The Old School" was coupled the name of Mr. Prest. In proposing this toast Mr. G. F. Rogers, and in seconding Mr. A. Pickworth, M. Sc., each spoke in humorous vein of "the good old days" and paid tribute to the influence of Mr. Prest, the value of which they had felt in their respective spheres in life.

We have before, and would again, urge all "Old Stocktonians" to make the Dinner the event of the year for the Association,—the occasion when all who can possibly manage it shall gather together to give evidence of that larger brotherhood, founded on common memories and common enthusiasms of early days, which is the great ideal of our Association.

The "big" Lecture was given in the Jubilee Hall, on Feb. 26th, by Mr. Will Owen, the well-known "Punch" artist and illustrator of W. W. Jacobs, and was entitled "Pure Fun." The Chair was taken by the Mayor of Stockton (R. Tyson Hodgson, Esq., J.P., C.C.), who has shown a most kindly interest in our work. Mr. Owen's sparkling anecdotes and lightning drawing were a sheer joy to the large audience which gathered to hear him. From the proceeds of the lecture the sum of £5 was sent to the Mayor's Boot Fund.

The "small" Lectures are given in a smaller hall than the "big" Lecture, but we hasten to disclaim any desire to place our kind lecturers "in their proper place" in making this differentiation of title.

The first Lecture, given on Dec, 1st by Mr. A. Scholes, F.I.C, an old pupil of the school, was entitled "The Iron Age." It was illustrated by numerous lantern slides, and proved thoroughly interesting and instructive to all who heard it. Mr. J. G. Taylor, F.C.S., was in the Chair, and referred to the pleasure which it gave him to be Chairman for a lecture delivered by an old pupil.

On March 16th, Mr. C. W. King, M.A., gave a lecture on "Sullivan—and Gilbert." Some 300 "Old Stocktonians" and friends were present and were evidently delighted at the Musical Illustrations rendered by the Misses Todd and Gleadhill, and Messrs. R. Blakey, R. Slater and N. Mudd. Mr. King was his usual self—bright, witty and eloquent—and the evening was one of pure enjoyment.

Mr. E. S. Knott, another old pupil of the school, gave a lecture, on April 13th, on "A visit to Constantinople via Salonika." The lecture was excellently illustrated and had all the interest which personal experience can give.

On February 2nd, a Concert was given in the Gymnasium, by the Myrtle Quartet Party, assisted by Messrs. Hale and Peach. Councillor T. Wilkinson was in the Chair and a thoroughly delightful evening was spent by a large gathering of "Old Stocktonians" and their guests. We offer our sincerest thanks to all the artistes and to Mr. Gavin Kay, who was mainly instrumental in inducing such excellent artistes to give of their best for our entertainment.

During the season a number of Smoking Concerts have been held, and have been fairly well attended. We should like to see still more members attending these pleasant evenings; the atmosphere is refreshingly informal, and the spirit of frank and genial comradeship which they call forth is just such as we wish to cultivate. Our best thanks are due to the subcommittee—Messrs. Dee, Allibone and Close—who have given a good deal of their time to organising these gatherings. Mr, Allibone, by the way, has not been in very good health lately; we sincerely hope that he will soon be completely recovered.

The Town War Memorial was unveiled on May 31st by the Earl of Durham. A beautiful wreath of laurel, cornflowers and narcissi, in the form of the "Old Stocktonian" badge, was laid at the foot of the Cenotaph by Mr. N. Rogers, our Secretary, in token of the undying memory of the Association of those Old Boys of the school who came not home again. A tribute to their memory was also placed on the school War Memorial—not this year on Armistice Day, which fell on a Saturday—but on Monday, Nov. 13th. Mr. E. S. Knott performed the ceremony, while Mr. L. T. Winn spoke to the present pupils on its meaning and significance.

It is with a deep sense of personal loss that we have to record the death of two of our members, Mr. Fred. Barclay, who was at one time a member of the Committee, and Mr. Walter Ross. To their families we extend our sincere sympathy in a loss which must seem hard indeed.

Likewise, we take a sad farewell of one of our old masters, Mr. L. Lumb, who passed away on October 7th. No one who knew Mr. Lumb could fail to appreciate his inherent kindness of heart, his sincerity of purpose, and the great earnestness with which he devoted himself to anything he undertook. Alike in school and in the greater world outside, he set a shining example of self-sacrifice and thought for others, and his death, at the comparatively early age of 47 represents a definite and abiding loss both to past and present scholars. To his sorrowing wife we render a respectful and heartfelt sympathy.

Hail and farewell, dear friends!

The end of the official year brings with it some changes. Mr. L. T. Winn, who after serving the Association as Secretary for some years, has been for the past session a highly popular and efficient President, now feels obliged to resign his office. At a recent Committee meeting several members endeavoured to get him to state the main reason for his decision, but in vain. All the same, we beg to offer him our very heartiest congratulations.

The year has also seen the resignation from the Committee of Mr. G. H. Swinburne. Mr. Swinburne, a Past President of the Association, is one to whom the "Old Stocktonians" will always feel greatly indebted for valuable and able work willingly done. We are indeed sorry that a variety of reasons has induced him to give up his work as a member of the Committee, and we hope most sincerely that he does not feel that thereby he has severed his connection with the Association.

We regret to learn that the Treasurer reports a falling off in the number of subscriptions paid this year. It would be of great assistance if members would send their subscriptions to the Treasurer at school, or would seek an opportunity of paying their subscriptions instead of waiting to be followed round and asked for them. An increase of membership is the first and most obvious sign of a flourishing Association.

The work of the coming year can only be successful in so far as the work of Presidents, Vice-Presidents, and Committee is supported by the ordinary non-official member with his presence and hearty co-operation.

With this last thought we send out to each of our members this Year Book, with its record of work done in the past year and its hope for support and encouragement in the coming session.
