EDITORIAL.

OUR task this year in introducing the "Old Stocktonians" Year Book to its readers is rather different from that with which we have been faced in previous years. When the Year Book first appeared, it was devoted solely to matter likely to be interesting to Old Boys. More recently, however, it has contained School news which has received constantly increasing space.

This transformation—or rather one should say amplification—is no mere accident, but represents a process of evolution. The list of names and addresses must always remain an essential feature of the Year Book, for the very first object of the Association is to ensure that all our Old Boys shall remain one family in cordial sympathy, bound together with the memory of common experiences and enthusiasms in the past. The addition of School news helps to remind us that School and "Old Stocktonians" are not two families, but one, and the stronger the links which bind them together, the better it is for each. Thus we hope that more and more the scholars of the present will come to regard membership of the "Old Stocktonians" and an active interest in its doings as the normal sequel to their school days, and that the heroes of ancient days will preserve an ever-fresh interest in the doings of those who have in their keeping the traditions created by their elders.

The Year Book, in its present form, has the additional merit of going some way towards meeting a real school need. For some years, the School issued each term a magazine which chronicled the social and athletic events of school life. Owing to the ever-increasing cost of production, it became impossible to continue to produce the magazine without incurring a considerable debt, to meet which no funds were available. The "Old Stocktonians" received most cordially the suggestion that an increase in the size of the Year Book would give an opportunity to the School to have a permanent record of its chief activities in work and sport. This year, therefore, we address ourselves to present scholars and their parents, as well as to all "Old Stocktonians" and friends of the Association.

This time last year we extended a cordial welcome to Mr. T. Crockett, our new Headmaster. The influence he has had on the School, and the interest he has shown in the "Old Stocktonians" have greatly increased the feelings of respect which his personality at first inspired in us. It is, therefore, with keen pleasure that we offer to him our sincere and respectful congratulations on having received the highest honour which a university has to offer. In the spring of this year, Mr. Crockett learned that his thesis for the degree of Doctor of Literature of his old University of Edinburgh had been accepted. Much patient research and sound scholarship have gone to the preparation of the thesis, and both the work itself and the degree which it has so well deserved confer great distinction on Dr. Crockett, and also on the School over which he presides.

During the year, the School, in the person of three of its Old Boys, has received signal academic honour. Messrs. A. Pickworth, E. M. Taylor, and F. J. Teago have each been granted the degree of Doctor of Science by the University of Durham. Only four Doctorates in Science were awarded by Durham University this year, and three have come to the Old Boys of our School. Surely this must constitute a record. To the new doctors we offer our proud congratulations, and can assure them that the holiday which the School received to celebrate their achievements was widely appreciated.

We are pleased to see that Mr. Prest continues to show the energy and healthful appearance of youth. We welcomed him at the "Old Stocktonians" dinner, and can assure him that we are always pleased to

see him at any of our functions. He is devoting his more ample leisure to the service of his fellow citizens, and his success at the recent Municipal Elections will be very popular.

Several changes have occurred in the School staff in the course of the year. The vacancy caused by the death of our esteemed and ever-regretted friend, Mr. Lumb, was filled for the latter half of the first term of the School year by Mr. A. Pestle, B.A., who left us at Christmas to take up an appointment at Melton Mowbray. During the time that he was with us, Mr. Pestle showed a very keen interest in all the activities of School life, and we wish him every success in the future. In the report of the work of the Historical Society, the name of his brother, the Rev. E. Pelham Pestle, of University College, Durham, receives grateful mention. We hope he will continue to befriend us in as kindly a manner as he did last winter. At the beginning of the New Year, we welcomed Mr. O. J. Fogarty, M.A. Mr. Fogarty stayed with us only one term and left us at Easter to take up the Professorship of English at the University of Malta. He was followed by Mr. T. B. Brooke, M.A., in whom we feel we are welcoming an old friend, for he is an Old Boy of the School—a Stocktonian by birth as it were, and not by naturalisation. He is the first Old Stocktonian to work on the Staff of the School, and in his own person typifies the close connection which should exist and which, we hope, will exist in ever-increasing measure between the present School in its fulness of life and the Old Stocktonians' Association.

In the pages that follow, the chief activities of the year of School and Old Boys' Association are reviewed, and in most cases any further comment is unnecessary. We should like, however, to refer to the establishment of an Old Stocktonians' Football Club. Difficulties of finance and organisation which had long appeared insuperable have at length been surmounted, and an enthusiastic and very creditable start has been made. This happy result is largely due to the kindness of Mr. J. Spark, who provided a field on very generous terms, to Mr. H. Broadbent, who rendered a disused dressing tent reasonably habitable, and to Mr E. Howie, whose secretarial and organising work have been beyond all praise.

A special effort has been made this year to get in touch with as many Old Boys as possible and to bring the Association to the notice of those who were not already members. This effort has been very successful; so much so that the number of subscriptions paid last year actually exceeded five hundred. But alas! we cannot end on such an optimistic note. The fact remains that a very large number of our members seem to feel that when they have paid their subscriptions and received the Year Book, they have done all that is necessary to maintain an interest in their old school. Another section of our members go somewhat further than this and show themselves always ready and willing to send a further subscription for any special effort. This is certainly very helpful, but it cannot be too strongly insisted that this is not sufficient. An Association such as ours exists for, and lives by, the personal touch. The very least that one has a right to expect from an Old Stocktonian is that the programme of the Association shall have pride of place on his list of engagements and that not lightly shall he allow himself to be prevented from being present at its functions.

We confidently trust that this old complaint of lack of support may be absent from our pages when next year we review the activities of the now opening session. With heartfelt wishes for the success of the School and Old Boys' Association in the future, and in the hope that it may do its tiny part to bind closer the bonds which bind the two, we send forth our little book with its message of remembrance to

School Football and Cricket, 1923-24.

On the whole, the School Football XI enjoyed a fair amount of success during last Season. Out of fourteen matches played, seven were won and five lost. Double victories were obtained over Stockton Grammar School, Northallerton Grammar School, and West Hartlepool Technical, whilst we were on the wrong side in both matches against Darlington Commercial. A heavy scoring game saw us lose to our old opponents at Gisborough Grammar School by 8 goals to 5.

The team generally played well together, our chief weakness being at half back. Usually we were represented by Lodge, Lowery, A. Thompson, Cox, Benzies, Threlkeld, Kennedy, Yellow, Barker, Clark, Bridson. Of these, Barker (Captain) at centre, Clark at inside left, Lowery at full back, and Lodge in goal all showed promise of future greatness.

The Cricket XI was not so successful. Want of facilities for decent practice which in its turn leads to a lack of enthusiasm for the summer game is largely responsible for this. So long as School Cricket is played on a piece of rural England which is well capable of providing exercises for geographical contours, so long shall we have to bemoan our want of success against Schools which are more happily blessed. One match was won out of seven played, this desirable result being largely brought about by the efforts of our Umpire (now unfortunately domiciled in Canada) whose interpretation of the rules laid down by the M.C.C. met with the unstinted approval of at least one eleven. With the possible exceptions of A. Thompson, Stonehouse and Barker, our batsmen were crude and agricultural in method: the tail was long and persistently refused to wag. Of the bowlers, Barker trundled with much velocity, Yellow specialised in a species of 'donkey drops'; and only A. Thompson preserved anything like a respectable length. The fielding as a whole was deplorably weak.

SPORTS DAY.

Friday, June 20th, 1924, was a glorious day. After the drenching rain of 1922, and the shower and high wind of 1923, we felt we deserved a fine sports day.

For some reason or other the number of visitors was smaller than usual, but for those who were present an excellent afternoon's sport was provided.

In the Senior Championship no records were broken, but it must be admitted that the condition of the ground was very unfavourable to fast times. In the Cricket Ball there was some very poor throwing and the winning distance was a long way behind the school record. The High Jump went to Swinbank, who jumps in very neat style. The 100 yds. and the quarter mile produced two very good finishes, Clark, in the former, winning a very close race, and Carr in the quarter coming away near the end for a very strong finish. The Hurdling is not yet very satisfactory and intending competitors in the future would do well to seek a little advice, and endeavour to get a little practice; no one so far seems to have got the knack of taking the hurdle neatly in his stride. There was one non-starter in the mile (a serious handicap this to his House) but of fifteen starters twelve finished, a very respectable proportion. A word of praise may be spared for Moore, who, though distanced, refused to give up and ran on and finished pluckily for the credit of his House. Considering that usually a good proportion of starters finish the mile, it may be suggested that competitors are inclined to take this race too timidly at the beginning and to spare themselves too cautiously. The time standing as the school record for the mile is by no means a grand one and, as it has stood now for six years, it is high time it was lowered. The value of every man in the team to his House may be seen by the fact that though the Red House secured the first and second places the Brown House (whose team finished 4, 5, 6 and 7), won the race.

The Junior Championship saw one record broken. J. Williams lowered the time for the 100 yards by $\frac{3}{10}$ sec. His time of $12\frac{7}{10}$ secs. is quite a good time for the Junior hundred yards, especially considering the unsatisfactory condition of the ground. As he also took first place in the 220 yards and the quarter mile he gained the Junior Championship very creditably.

Of the open events the 100 yards Handicap was chiefly noticeable for the absence of the 'crack' performers. The Wheelbarrow Race and the Sack Race gave the youngsters an opportunity to occupy the stage, and the Obstacle Race caused as much amusement to the spectators as usual. The Tug of War showed some plucky efforts to break the rope, but there was no such titanic struggle as last year's final.

R. Clark took the Senior Championship with the good mixed bag of firsts in the 100 yards and Cricket Ball, second in the Hurdles, and third in the quarter mile. Among the Cups presented by the Rev. H. S. Milner at the conclusion of the Sports, was the "Weatherhead" Cup won by L. Lowery who with his partner J. Carr represented the School in competition with several other Schools of the district at the Middlesbrough Junior Technical School Sports.

Our thanks are due to all who contributed to make the Sports a success; to those who gave refreshments, to those who assisted in their preparation and distribution, and to all who gave willingly of unseen labour so much of which is necessary to produce a successful Sports Day.

At the conclusion of the swimming, R. Roger, Esq., J.P., the chairman of the School Governors, distributed the Graded Tests Proficiency Certificates, which had been gained during the season, and afterwards presented the medals and certificates to the successful competitors. The House Swimming Cup was won by the Green House with 36 points.

TENNIS TOURNAMENT.

The Tennis Tournament, which was first played last year, attracted a considerably larger number of entries this year. We were glad to see so many interested in Tennis, for the greater the competition the greater the incentive to practice, and hence results an all-round improved standard of play. The earlier rounds were devoted to the painless extinction of the rabbits—those stout hearty fellows who play soccer or rugger or cricket and who can see perfectly well that anybody can play tennis with its two simple rules "over the net and into the court." They showed considerable surprise at some of the things a tennis ball *could* do.

The first of the semi-finals was between E. Harris and D. McIntyre. Harris seemed rather impressed by the dignity of his opponent and, after having put up quite a good fight in the first two or three games, lost heart all too soon and, though he got one game in the second set and none in the first, put up a much feebler fight in most games as the match proceeded.

McIntyre beat Harris 6—0; 6—1.

The other semi-final produced a much keener game. Here we had two enthusiastic juniors, not afraid of each other and each out to win. This match also developed something of a territorial interest as C. H. Watson was the white hope of those who come from Dinsdale, while R. Williams had the support of the Norton Contingent. Play was distinctly good and there were some very sporting rallies.

Williams beat Watson 6—3; 6—2.

The final produced a very interesting match. At the beginning Williams, like Harris, appeared to be unnerved by McIntyre's unexcitable deliberation and a good many shots went astray. In the second set however he found his feet and his form, and though McIntyre wriggled to the extent of taking one game to deuce three times he had, at last, to acknowledge defeat in this set without taking a single game. In the deciding set both opponents pulled themselves together and a ding-dong struggle resulted, till the games stood at fours all, after which McIntyre—possibly feeling the weight of his years—sank beneath the strain and lost two games in succession.

R. Williams beat D. McIntyre 2—6; 6—0; 6—4.

The winner gives every promise of being an excellent tennis player, his volleying being particularly hopeful. He is still inclined to let things down occasionally—he will for instance sometimes smash a "sitter" at his own feet—but given the practice and experience of three or four years we should see something well above the average of Club Tennis.

The Cup was presented on Sports Day, to the well-deserved accompaniment of the acclamations of the assembled multitude.

CHESS TOURNAMENT.

Some interesting if not first rate chess was witnessed in the annual tournament for the "A. W. Welch" Shield. This was particularly the case in the final round, when Thatcher and Cox again fought out their duel of last year, the former for the second time proving the victor.

The handicaps given were R., Kt. and P. and 2 moves, the latter providing the best games. It appeared that P. to Q 3 provides a better continuation for black than P-K 3 for the first moves in the P and 2 game; while in the knight handicap, the King's Bishop's Gambit was the most popular, as it gave white opportunity for regaining his piece or of establishing an attack, particularly when the Gambit was taken.

Through the kindness of the Stockton Chess Club, the two finalists are admitted to Honorary Membership, and it is indeed pleasing to note that two winners of the Welch Shield, E. Mitchell and W. Thatcher, have already represented Tees-side in their annual match versus Newcastle.

SCHOOL HISTORICAL SOCIETY.

The Session 1923-4 has seen the birth of a new School Society. Although it rejoices in the name of the "School Historical Society," many of its activities are connected with history only in so far as that subject takes all knowledge for its province, and it has therefore found time in its moments of relaxation to glance at lesser and more trivial things.

During its first year, the Society reached a membership of 35: the Headmaster acted as President with Cunnington as his confrère, Robson and later Saunders undertook the duties of scribes and collectors of the monies, while Sanderson, Benzies and Barker in the capacity of committeemen kept a critical eye on the other officials, and lent weight, judgment and wisdom to their deliberations.

Its programme in the Autumn and Spring terms embraced a number of lantern lectures by Dr. Crockett on "Mediæval Arms and Armour," by Mr. Allan on "Ancient Stone Crosses," by the Rev. E. Pelham Pestle, of University College, Durham, on "Life in a Modern University," and by Mr. Armstrong on "India" and "New Zealand." On one occasion, too, the members of the Society visited a local theatre and saw a cinematograph representation of "A Journey Across Canada," while Mr. Baldwin with his paper on "Small Boys," and Mr. King with his "Yeoman of the Guard" lecture (vocal illustrations by Mr. Manners) added further variety to a very strenuous programme.

Debates were also held and topics like the "Present Government," "Capital Levy" and "Free Trade" evoked the usual division of opinion. Unfortunately, Scott and Robson, two of the most enthusiastic and eloquent orators, left the School at Xmas, and the main contributions to debate were afterwards made by Cunnington, Thatcher and Saunders, whose prowess seemed to frighten all but a few of the others. It is hoped that since Thatcher is the only "lion" who remains in 1924-5, the junior members of the Society will do some "roaring" for themselves in the future, and will even venture to twist the tail of their senior brother.

Just after the opening of the Spring term, a successful social evening was spent, whist, games and puzzle competitions forming the basis of most of the enjoyment. Save that the refreshments were not thought to be sufficiently substantial (for even budding historians must eat), everything passed off as merrily as the proverbial marriage bell.

Cycling expeditions to Durham and Mount Grace Priory on the only two really hot days in the year concluded the season's programme. On the first occasion, Mr. Pestle added to the obligations of the Society by providing tea in his rooms at Durham Castle. So entertaining a host did he prove that the party did not leave until the Cathedral was closed, and admittance was obtained only by an appeal to the Sub-Dean, who was taking his evening stroll.

Thus it will be seen that the Historical Society is at least active. Possibly some kindly donor might see his way to present a shield to encourage debate. Who knows but that such a trophy might be the means of unearthing some youthful Demosthenes at present lying hidden in one of the Second Forms?

THE MAYOR VISITS US.

A pleasing ceremony took place in School on October 10th, 1924. The Mayor of Stockton, Councillor Wilkinson, has during his year of office paid an official visit to each of the schools in the town. Feeling that his self-imposed task would be incomplete if he omitted to visit the "best school of all" he asked—and to ask was to be assured of a ready and willing consent—if he might come and see us "at home" so to speak.

The School assembled in the gymnasium, and soon there entered the Mayor and Mayoress resplendent in their chains of office. As a prelude to the main proceedings, a bouquet was presented to the Mayoress by Maurice Scott on behalf of the School. After a few words of introduction by Dr. Crockett, the Mayor spoke to us words of wisdom. Among other things he urged us to respect lawful authority, and told us a story (much too good to be entirely lost) which, apparently, was intended to increase our respect for authority in the person of the policeman. He pleaded also for the cultivation of a sense of humour. The School as a whole grew taller when he told us that we "represented the intelligence of Stockton" (*ipsisimimis verbis*).

At the conclusion of the Mayor's address, the Captain of the School called for three cheers for the Mayor. These were given timidly at first; so much so that the Vice-Captain's appeal for three cheers for the Mayoress received the more generous response of growing confidence. In order to show that no invidious distinction was implied we gave one more cheer for the Mayor, the effort startling a motor-car left unattended two streets away. None of our efforts, however, exceeded in spontaneity and heartiness the applause which followed the announcement that the School would then close for the afternoon.

OLD BOYS' REPORTS.

Lecture by Commander Worsley—"Shackleton's Life Story"— Jubilee Hall, February 12th.

During the lifetime of the Association, we have been treated to many lectures on diverse subjects, but it is doubtful whether any of the lengthening list has proved more deeply interesting than that given by Commander Worsley on "Shackleton's Life Story."

It had been arranged that the lecturer this year should be Dr. A. M. Blackman on the very topical subject of "The Treasure Tombs of Luxor," but a sudden illness prevented the eminent Egyptologist from being present, and we were indeed fortunate in being able to secure the services of Commander Worsley at such short notice.

The Lecturer had a great story to tell, the tale 'of the worst journey in the world.' It was, in the first place, a loyal tribute to the memory of a gallant sailor and a great leader by a comrade who knew him as one only learns to know men one has sailed with on long voyages and in a small ship where personal traits stand out in such bold relief. It was a yarn of high adventure in stormy and frozen seas told at first hand by a seaman who did not let the fact that he happened to be on a platform influence his style of off-watch yarning. Commander Worsley's was a story of incredible hardship tackled light-heartedly, and his unassuming style of telling it will remain long in the memory.

The lecture was illustrated by slides, some of which were remarkably fine specimens of photographic reproduction, and the frequent applause testified to the keen enjoyment of a large and representative audience.

The Mayor, Councillor T. Wilkinson, presided, and it was a matter of considerable satisfaction to the Association to be able at the close of the lecture to present through the President, Mr. C. J. Osborne, a cheque for £10 to the Local Boot Fund.

To the Mayor as well as to their good friends, Alderman and Mrs. R. Spark who kindly entertained the Lecturer, the best thanks of the Old Stocktonians are due.

A conjuror gained instant appreciation, and when Professor Will Fleet (an Old Boy) with his Punch and Judy Show made his appearance, the delight of the children knew no bounds. Finally, a loud knock heralded the approach of Father Xmas who had willingly agreed to appear a little earlier than usual. Needless to say, his reception was overwhelming. And so our guests departed bountifully laden both inside and out.

So successful a function was this that one may perhaps ask to whom the chief credit is due. Let it be sufficient to say that save for one or two items (notably a splendid gift by Messrs George Horner of "Dainty Dinah" fame), the whole pleasant burden of entertainment was borne by Old Boys themselves and those closely connected with them.
