### *Inter-School Sports.*

The seventh inter-school sports were held on the school field at Barnard Castle, on Friday, June 29th, 1934.

The evening was glorious and the run to and from Barnard Castle as well as our very kindly entertainment there, made this year's sports an event to remember long and pleasurably.

Moreover, as will be seen from the results, we made a rather better showing and moved up one place in the completed list of schools. To minimise somewhat the influence of a single outstanding competitor on the results, and to give greater weight to the sports as a test of the *teams* of the competing schools, points were this year awarded in descending order to the five first places in each event.

N. R. Dodds—as last year—strove manfully and, in particular, his hurdling showed very good style; J. Sharkey did well to clear 5 ft. 1 in. in the jump; but again G. A. Rowe's was the outstanding achievement. Although his time in the mile was comparatively slow this was owing to the plan of campaign for he ran a magnificent tactical race, coming away as he liked in the last half lap to win by 40 yards or so. Who will take his place next year? and who will train seriously and win more points for us at Bishop Auckland?

### *Inter-School Cross Country, 1934.*

This year there were five competing schools, Newcastle Royal Grammar School coming in. The race, which was held at Stockton, was won by Coatham, although Newcastle supplied the first man home. Considering that we were without our two best runners Rowe and Lloyd we did very well to finish second to Coatham. The final placings were—1, Coatham 92; 2, Stockton 127; 3, Newcastle 146; 4, Middlesbrough 164; 5, Darlington 301.

### *Annual Swimming Sports,*

*October 15th, 1934.*

This year's sports were held in unprecedented circumstances. Competitors only were allowed at the Baths, whilst their less amphibious confreres had to spend a very pleasant afternoon at their studies. As a result the races took place in a silence which, compared with the usual noise, was quite unearthly. However, it proved to be a vintage year for records—seven were broken altogether—and C Urwin had the distinction of breaking four. Morgan's record for the plunge which, according to the rules of avoirdupois was impregnable, was easily broken by this fine swimmer. Another competitor who came well to the front amongst the seniors was B. Race, whilst his younger brother H. Race won the neat dive for the second year in succession. The Red House carried off the squadron race by about ten yards after a brilliant but unavailing attempt by Urwin to retrieve the position of the Blue House. Urwin, who promises to be one of the best swimmers the school has produced, easily secured the Senior Championship with a total of sixteen points.

Some good swimmers were revealed amongst the Juniors and three Junior records were broken, two by N. Thompson and one by T. Samuel.

### House Matches.

The football cup was taken from the Blue House by the Green this year. The Green were defeated only once, namely by the Red, by the narrow margin of 5-4. The cup was won by a good team and credit is due to the scoring abilities of the Martin Bros. and the excellent defensive play of Fenny and Stirling.

### Rugger.

We are still feeling our way so far as this game is concerned and last season were able to claim only one victory, against Middlesbrough High School. Now that we have both terms in which to learn the game, we are hoping that we shall be able to give a better account of ourselves in future matches.

## Cricket.

The Cricket season of 1934 was not particularly successful, only three matches being won out of eight played. We were weak generally, and particularly so in fielding, which always seems to be our great failing. The matches won were against St. Mary's, Middlesbrough, Great Ayton, and the Grammar School, while we were beaten by Gisborough (twice), the High School, Middlesbrough, and St. Mary's, Middlesbrough.

Dodds was awarded a *News Chronicle* bat for a good performance against the Grammar School in which match he scored 54, and took 9 wickets for 14 runs.

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## School Cross Country Race.

This race is now part of the games curriculum and is compulsory to boys of the Senior School. Points count as in the School mile race, both House and individual, in the Annual School Sports. This year the race was won by Rowe, with Gedling and Atterton respectively second and third. The House placings were 1 Brown, 2 Red, 3 Green, 4 Blue. Brown House, therefore, hold the cup for one year.

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## Tennis.

There were about 28 entries, quite a good field of promising players. The unexpected was common—the sixth formers being surprised with the quality of the play of the younger entrants. The competition was favoured with very hot though somewhat windy weather.

In the semi-finals G. Stirling met J. Sharkey, when Stirling—playing well throughout the tournament—won the battle; and L. Turner met T. Lloyd, the latter being unexpectedly beaten.

The final resulted in Stirling carrying the day rather easily, a worthy winner.

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## "A. W. Welch" Chess Shield.

The annual tournament for the above trophy attracted thirteen entrants this year and the standard of play was distinctly higher than on the preceding occasion. Room 12A was the scene of that riotous excitement which is commonly said to be the main attribute of chess players, but had the ghosts of Aitkens and Thatchers visited the scene of combat they would doubtless have replayed their immortal games in a frosty silence, disdainful of the puny efforts of their successors, for they made their reputations when chess was the pastime of kings.

Although no new player appeared to be following in these exalted footsteps the keen interest of the players promised well for the future.

After some interesting play, in which Callender and Swinburne distinguished themselves gallantly but unavailingly, the issue was left to last year's finalists Metcalfe and Gedling. Here experience told its tale and the latter won despite the heroic resistance offered by his opponent.

## *Literary and Historical Society,*

*Session 1933-34.*

The past session has been a very successful one for the Literary and Historical Society. We have listened with pleasure to some extremely interesting lectures, which included accounts of travels in the United States by Mr. J. C. Dickinson, and of a visit to Soviet Russia by Mr. H. G. Miller. Earlier in the session Mr. Hibbs gave us a fine talk entitled "Then and Now," describing changes in local life since his boyhood; and Mr. Crooks related in a fascinating lecture on "Sugar," the story of the processes through which sugar passes from the factory to the consumer. We are heartily grateful to all our lecturers.

The session opened with a "Hat Night." Mr. Clark, with a brilliant speech on the Decalogue, won the prize—honorary membership of the Society.

The inter-House debating competition was won for the third successive year by the Red House. The standard of most of the debates was high. In one or two, however, there were very few speeches from the floor,—so that the final speakers had nothing to which they could reply. We hope that in the new session speeches from the floor will be more numerous. [Stop press: This hope is being fulfilled]

The fourth forms debated passionately a motion concerning homework. Form 4 M carried the day. At a joint debate with the Girls' School we decided in favour of Co-Education.

The first meeting of the Easter term was a Magazine night. Contributions of various kinds were read by members, and much talent was brought to light. The prizes were won by Mr. Gedling and Mr. Winspear.

One or two innovations were made during the course of the session. Perhaps the most important was the use of a Minute Book, which will provide posterity with a worthy record of our members' activities. But the most spectacular of the innovations were undoubtedly the Mock Trial and the Model Parliament, which took place respectively at the end of the Christmas and the Easter Term.

In the first of these, Mr. Peter Hall Smiles was found guilty on a serious charge, and sent down for a long stretch. A fund has been opened for the relief of his dependents. All subscriptions should be forwarded to the Hon. Treasurer of the Society. Of the more fortunate members of the cast, counsel were argumentative and dogmatic, as all good barristers should be; the judge was somewhat tyrannical, as all good judges should be, and the witnesses—from the stolid P.C. to the fussy Mrs. Murgatroyd and the blushing damsel—were as mentally contradictory as all the best witnesses are.

The session of the Model Parliament was occupied—after questions, and the introduction of a new member—with an opposition vote of censure on the Government for its foreign and imperial policy. This was moved by Mr. Atkinson, who was supported by Messrs. Shields and Clark. An amendment from the extreme Right was moved by Mr. Sowler. From the extreme Left we had a speech by Mr. Maclean. The Government's policies were successfully defended by Messrs. Gedling, Gleave and Kirtley.

We hope that Open Meetings of varied nature will become a regular end-of-term feature of our programme.

The Annual Party was a great success, though it was alleged that some of our best trenchmen were not at the top of their form. Apart from the food, the main events of the evening were ping pong, dominoes, a whist drive, and an ingenious competition.

In conclusion—an announcement: All Old Boys are invited to the meeting to be held on Friday, 20th January, at 6-30, and to take part in the debate which is to be held on that date. We hope to have two Old Boys among our principal speakers, and to make the subject one which will interest both past and present members of the Society.

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### *School Journeys.*

On Monday, 5th June, a number of boys from the junior forms paid a visit to Mount Grace Priory and Fountains Abbey. The day was delightfully fine and the party greatly enjoyed the visits, particularly that to Mount Grace where they saw the finest Carthusian ruin in England.

Owing to the difficulty of arranging a cheap enough fare to Denmark, it was found impossible to take a party there as had been hoped. Accordingly we took the best we could get and, starting from Middlesbrough, a number of senior boys went by sea to Leith and spent a couple of days in Edinburgh. Thence they proceeded to Antwerp, and spent a day seeing the sights of Brussels and another in Antwerp. The trip included visits to two Zoos, one at Corstorphine and the other at Antwerp. Both passed without mishap, and indeed the memorable event was probably the shuffleboard international match in which the party defended the honour of England. C. Hill is a board shuffler of great promise; we heard much of him at the time and may hear more—after this.

The voyage concluded as it had begun, in Middlesbrough; a pleasant and health-giving journey.

## *The School Speech Day.*

The Speech Day took place on December 13th, in the Jubilee Hall, and, despite the ominous significance of the date, the function proved one of the most successful we have ever had. Indeed, we have it on good authority that the Education Officer of a town not 100 miles away confessed it was one of the most enjoyable at which he had ever been present during a lengthy experience.

The Headmaster's Report was concerned with the various school activities which are mentioned in detail elsewhere in this issue. Suffice it to say that his report was again one of a gratifying successful session, and all must have agreed with his grateful references to all of the Masters to whose efforts such success is due.

Dr. Braley, Principal of Bede College, Durham, was the speaker of the evening. His address was interesting, timely, and pointed with many flashes of wit. He admitted that the teaching of boys was no easy matter, although, strangely enough, the layman usually thought the opposite. It was indeed curious, he said, that while the ordinary person would not venture to instruct the doctor, the chemist, the candlestick-maker as to his particular job, that same ordinary person should yet suppose himself perfectly qualified to express full and free opinion as to what schools ought to be doing. And yet Education is more difficult than ever before. The trend of life to-day and the demands for modern proficiency are towards what is known in industry as team production, and the men and women who work are considered as masses rather than as individuals. The whole tendency of modern life is to make men regard themselves as members of groups and to sacrifice individuality for the sake of the group. While our system must prepare pupils for after school life, Dr. Braley went on to say, it must develop the personality, the individuality and the creativeness of the boy. There was also the mighty question of leisure. The relationship between work and leisure had radically changed since the War. Methods of mass production had been broadcast already and would be done more so in the future. The results of such mass production had reduced the number of working hours and had altered the character of the pupil to day. What to do with this problem of leisure was a very serious question for the schoolmaster. At present we spend our leisure hours in the mass: watching games in mass, the cinema, the wireless, etc., must fail to provide that opportunity for development of character which is absolutely essential if a person must be an individual and not merely one of a crowd. Inevitably, leisure will come to be regarded as the chief business of life; and the problem for the schoolmaster will not merely be to educate boys to pass examinations, but to prepare them to live in this new world of leisure. A boy wants to relate everything in his life to everything else, and we schoolmasters, said Dr. Braley, have got to enable the boy to find a centre purpose for which he is instinctively looking.

How often, we wonder, has Mr. Kay heard his praises sung, (this is not meant as a joke!)? It need hardly be added that his choristers acquitted themselves admirably. It would be surprising if anything else could be said, for has not Mr. Kay, in gaining that coveted blue ribbon of all Choir Masters, the Blackpool Challenge Musical Festival Shield, proved himself—if indeed any proof were necessary—that he is one of *the* big noises in the musical world (this, again, is not meant as a joke).



As for the Orchestra, it is very evidently going from strength to strength. The choice of programme itself was of that high standard which one naturally associates with the high gifts of musicianship of its Conductor, and while each member deserved warm praise for his individual playing, it is only fair to say that to Mr. King is due the largest share of congratulations. His coaching, enthusiasm and tactful guidance were clearly reflected in an extremely meritorious and enjoyable performance. It is to be remembered, too, that actual performance is only one side of this activity; to foster and increase the ability properly to appreciate orchestral music is also one of its not least important features.

And so, with the singing of "Jerusalem" by the whole assembly, one of our most successful Speech Days came to an end.

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### *Music.*

On one or two occasions the Wednesday music was performed to a house almost "full to capacity," but most often we had to be satisfied with very much less than that, though we have never been without audience "fit though few,"—our following of faithful seekers after truth who wish that their music shall satisfy their brains and not be regarded merely as a sort of understudy to alcohol as an inspirer of artificial gaiety.

Among the special treats of the year were violin and piano sonatas of Bach and César Franck, 'cello sonatas of Beethoven and Godard, Schubert trio op. 99 and Mozart Kegelstatt trio, the Arthur Bliss piano quartet, and a delightful programme of songs, for which we were again indebted to our kind friend Mr. J. M. Jones. For the instrumental music our best thanks are due and are hereby accorded with acclamation to Mr. H. Spottiswoode, Mr. L. Knox, Mr. R. Robinson and Mr. and Mrs. H. Russell.

The House Competition produced a few good performances, and, in particular, the choral singing revealed great keenness and real achievement. As usual, Mr. Gavin Kay chose the set pieces and judged the performances in his inimitable way. We thank him most heartedly. The Blue House, who gained 43 points, were the winners.

For Speech Day the orchestra played a suite arranged from Handel's Water Music, Arne's Two Dances from *Comus*, Elgar's Serenade from *The Wand of Youth*, and the March from *Judas Maccabeus*.

Now that the plans for the new school are actually on the way, it may not be too early to suggest that some really old boy might like to begin to save up so that he can present to us a fine organ—none of your American or mouth variety—for the new School Hall.

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In a French dramatic competition for schools in the district, organised by the Tees-side branch of the Modern Languages Association, and held at the Middlesbrough High School, our team, presenting scenes from Labiche's "La Cagnotte," came third, the first and second places going respectively to Stockton Secondary School for Girls and Guisborough Grammar School. Our team was made up of E. Clark, A. H. McLean, G. W. Mantle, A. Robinson, D. H. Lee, H. Coates and J. D. Smith.

The school was visited on March 6th by Roy Newlands, of the Old Vic., who presented "Hamlet" and extracts from Molière's "L'Avare."

Two days later Norman Williams and his Company performed "Macbeth" almost in entirety.

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## OLD BOYS REPORTS.

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### O. S. Dance.

Our first Dance for a season or two took place during February, at the Maison de Danse, in Yarrin Lane. In spite of a spell of Arctic cold, the exertions of enthusiastic sellers of tickets resulted in a gathering of over three hundred for an extremely delightful evening. There were very few indeed present who were not members of the old school, a fact which made the function not merely a dance but something in the nature of a re-union. In the absence of the Mayor, our President (who was called away to London), the Mayoress very kindly and graciously honoured us with her presence and encouragement, a courageous and sporting gesture for which we must express our deep gratitude. The Benevolent Fund benefited from the venture by the sum of ten pounds, which we would have liked to have been more.

For 1934-35 we have engaged the Hall for two Dances. Will our members please note this, together with the opinion voiced by more than a few—that the Dance was one of the most attractive of the season from all points of view.

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### Poor Children's Treat.

This again added some real zest to the Festive Season for those many of our members who contributed in various ways to the enjoyment of the little band of deserving ones which we are able to entertain at Christmastide. The event, though repeating itself in such metriculous detail year by year, never loses its sparkle and freshness; and we hope it never will. One of the most pleasing features was the realisation that, though time with its changes inevitably takes from us many who have carried through the task of keeping the fun going, there are always younger members able and willing to take their places. On this occasion we were indeed almost bewildered with the galaxy of fresh talent, which, school days completed not in the very distant past, found it good fun graduating in another school, that of directing the laughter of exuberant urchins on a very rare occasion. So may we go on.

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### The Stocktonians' Sixteenth Annual Dinner.

The sixteenth Annual Dinner was held in Spark's Café, on Friday, December 22nd, 1933. The food and some of the drink having been disposed of (care being taken to leave sufficient for the toasts), the President rose to welcome our guests. He first paid tribute to our old friend Mr. Robert Roger and expressed regret that Mr. Roger had considered the unimportant incident of his eightieth birthday sufficient excuse for resigning the chairmanship of the Governors of

the school. He then turned to the guest of the evening, our fellow Old Stocktonian Mr. F. W. Dixon—Freddy—even “young Freddy”—as the mayor, mindful of old school days together, described him. The President told how “Freddy” had won the first Tourist Trophy side-car race as long ago as 1923, the Junior Tourist Trophy in 1927, and the Manin Beg Race in 1923. He maintained that the hunt for speed records was not the purposeless thing that some people would have it, for the speed fiends of the past had produced the transport of to-day. Commercial transport at 250 miles an hour was already being visualised and we might yet live to travel from Stockton to London in an hour. In the roll of distinguished guests whom we had delighted to honour Mr. Dixon worthily took his place by reason of his achievements.

To Mr. Stanley Proud, of St. John's College, Cambridge, fell the task of proposing the toast of the school. We find some difficulty in giving the substance of Mr. Proud's speech. At first we thought we were being given a rather Sterne draught of shandy-gaff, but remembering—just in time—that English Literature only came into existence with the accession of his present majesty, we came eventually to the conclusion that here was an attempt to out-nickel Beverley. Apparently thinking aloud, Mr. Proud wondered whether he should speak of the school in eulogistic vein, as is done on speech days; whether he should dramatise the staff as a Comedy of Errors; or frankly inflict upon us the stories to which his friends refused to listen. Beyond this point we appear to have lost the main trend of his thought, though embodying recollections of dirty knees on Speech Day, Lady Godiva, Borstal, desks used for shove-half-penny, and the unbelievable word necrophilia, and Mr. Proud gathered momentum as he proceeded.

At this point it was found necessary to sublimate a portion of the excess of high spirits characteristic of Mr. H. W. Inman by allowing him to conduct us through a comedy number known as *The Blackbirds*.

Dr. Kinnes has a difficult task each year in responding to the toast of the school, for it cannot be easy to sound a fresh note. He told us that his present impression of his own old school was that it had gone to pieces since his day, but he could find no confirmation of this impression in actual school results or activities. It was our habit to think that we were the people and wisdom would die with us, but statistics gave a truer impression of affairs and these showed that our school was as flourishing as ever. Dr. Kinnes was young enough to express the hope that we should be in the new school in two years. (We could not help wondering why, for the last twenty years, “two years” has always been the appointed limit).

Mr. F. W. Dixon proposed the toast of the Association. He protested that whatever he may have learnt at school it was not the gift of the gab. He is sometimes surprised to realise that he is an Old Stocktonian for he has gathered that all Old Stocktonians are good boys! But the knowledge that he is an Old Boy has helped to give him a superiority complex since Stocktonians are distinguished in all walks of life and in all parts of the world. He is glad to have done something to justify the efforts expended on him in the old days, and he hopes to keep the school flag flying in the future. He praised the officials for their pertinacity in pursuing and running him to earth and voiced his appreciation of the Benevolent Fund and the Poor

Kiddies' Treat. Mr. Dixon concluded with a message of kindly greeting to all absent friends which we hereby circulate as far as the Stocktonian will reach.

Mr. R. Roger, in returning thanks for the President's words of welcome, told us a neat little story of a disapproving aunt who had been won over to a truer appreciation of the essential kindness of her up-to-date nephew's horsey friends by hearing one of them, in whose railway carriage she had travelled to Newmarket, refer feelingly to a horse which had been scratched and was bleeding on which he had put his shirt. His splendid wish for us—a tribute to his own fine character—was that we might live as long as he and at his age find ourselves with as many good friends as he had.

The speech of the President in replying to the toast of the Association has come to be regarded as one of the notable features of the dinner, since he has opportunities for a wider view of the excellences and the defects of humanity than falls to the lot of most of us, and on these he has brought to bear a sound and comprehending judgment and a wise tolerance. Fortunately he has been able to retain his sense of buoyant humour. He began by declaring—falsely—that like Mr. Proud he had nothing to say, and then told us—apparently truthfully—that only a little while before a very indignant man had burst into his office and erupted to the effect that he had been to see Alderman Brownsmith who had told him to go to—the usual place to which unwanted humanity is consigned—and therefore he had come to Mr. Mayor! In more earnest vein the President warned us that our Association could only be as good as its members, and exhorted us all to shape our course that in the twilight of our lives we might have the comforting assurance that we had done something to leave the world a better place than we had found it. Perhaps we were too much inclined to limit to one season the Christmas feeling; what we called the Christmas spirit should be the spirit of the whole year. Education should teach us to disseminate friendship and helpfulness; without such ideals we had better be barbarians. We were looking forward in doubting hope to our new school. Bricks and mortar are but a means to an end; it is the spirit which informs the corporate body of people who constitute the school which is important. "It is something to have kicked a pebble out of the path of the other fellow."

Mr. Bolton and Mr. Cummings entertained us in the intervals between the speeches, and when we had sung "Should auld acquaintance be forgot" we took away with us the memory of another happy re-union. But we had not mustered the hundred members which is our aim.

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### *Old Boys' Benevolent Fund.*

The above Fund has now completed its 8th year, and it is perhaps not now out of place to consider whether it has succeeded in realising the hopes of its sponsors. In 1926, an Old Boy almost in a moment and through no fault of his own found himself in a desperate condition. Friends had left him, misery had come to his home, and funds were unavailable. It was to meet such cases as this that the Benevolent Fund was formed, for it was then felt that an Old Boys' Association, good as was its work in other directions, was not fulfilling its complete destiny unless it had some speedy means of rendering aid to a brother who had

fallen on evil times. From the beginning, the work of the Fund has been carried on in silence. Appeals have been sent in, have been considered, a grant or loan as the case may be has been made, and no one has been the wiser except the Trustees and the recipient. No appeal has ever been refused, but it is permissible to say here that the generosity of the Trustees has always been largely affected by the amount of money at their disposal.

Since the inception of the Fund, its total income has been roughly £352, this being made up by grants from the General Fund, by the results of special efforts, by private subscriptions, by the balance from the Poor Children's Treats, and by repayments. It should be noted too that included in the income is a sum of £50 which was loaned by three Old Boys to meet cases of extreme urgency.

In all, twenty Old Boys have been assisted, six receiving grants not for repayment, while the fourteen others have received loans either for a short time or extending over a considerable period.

Usually, the loans have been made for the purpose of starting an Old Boy on a career, but in one case at least help was given to tide over a temporary business difficulty. The grants, however, have had a much wider application, and have varied from the provision of a suit of clothes to the payment of fees for tuition in typewriting or the securing of adequate medical aid.

At the moment £27 is in hand and a total of £289 is out on good loan, while £10 may be counted off as a bad debt.

In passing, it should be noted that many grateful letters of thanks have been received from those who have benefited by the Fund, while in two cases Old Boys, in repaying their loans, also made a substantial subscription to our finances.

In days of industrial depression like the present, the need for such a Fund is very urgent, and it is, therefore, to be hoped that the more fortunate among the Old Boys, when they are making their subscription to the Poor Children's Treat, will not forget also to include a trifle towards an object which from its very nature is not able to advertise itself so much as it deserves.

# RULES.

## Old Stocktonians' Association.

*Revised October, 1929.*

1.—The name of the Association shall be the "Old Stocktonians."

The "Old Stocktonians" aims at continuing friendships and preserving that spirit of comradeship which ought to exist among those who have been educated at the same school. These aims are to be achieved by means of social, recreative, and educational pursuits.

2.—The Association shall be open to the Old Boys of the Stockton Secondary School and of the late Higher Grade School. Past and present members of the staff are also eligible.

3.—The government of the Association shall be vested in three Presidents, six Vice-Presidents, a Treasurer, two Secretaries and a Committee of sixteen, together with the Secretary of each sub-section.

(a) The present and retired headmasters shall be Presidents ex-officio. The third shall be elected annually.

(b) All the other officials shall be elected annually.

(c) A member holding any office shall be eligible for re-election in the following year, in the same or any capacity,

(d) In Committee seven shall form a quorum.

(e) The Committee shall have power to co-opt any member or members at their discretion for the time being for any particular purpose.

4.—The Committee shall have power to refuse membership to any applicant for admission or to ask any member to resign (after investigation by the Committee and confirmation by a general meeting), whose conduct they consider such as to militate against the welfare of the Association.

5.—Each Section shall be self-governing and self-supporting. The Committee, however, shall have power to grant financial aid to any section.

Each Section shall submit its programme to the General Committee for approval.

6.—The Annual Subscription shall be one shilling for the first two years after leaving School—after that it shall be two shillings—payable to any member of the Committee, before January 1st. In lieu of an Annual Subscription, a Life Subscription of twenty-five shillings may be made.

7.—These Rules shall be altered only at the Annual General Meeting, and then only by a two-thirds majority; all motions of such alteration to be in the hands of the Secretaries four days before the date of such meeting.

8.—The Annual General Meeting shall be held in September or October.

9.—The Financial Year shall end on the 31st December.
