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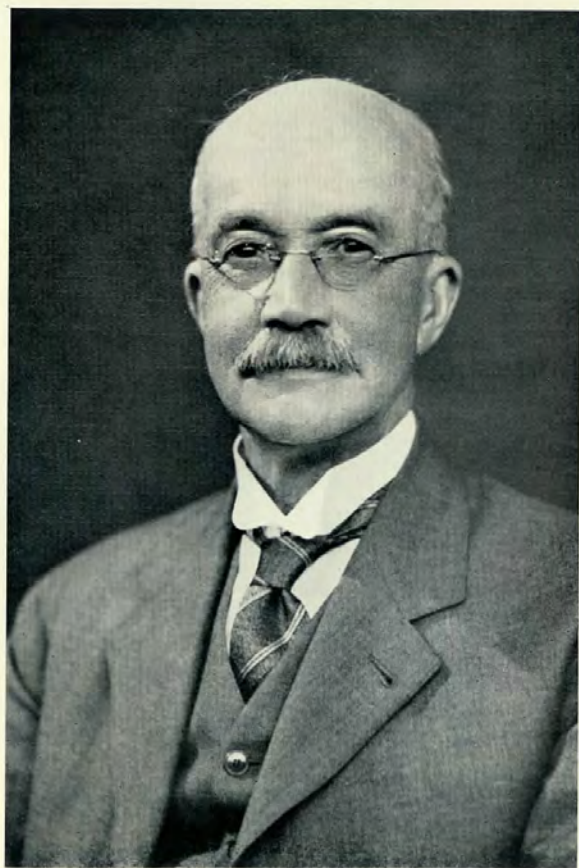

JOHN JOSEPH PREST,
Died November 12th, 1936.

Aged 78.

First Headmaster of Stockton Secondary School,
January, 1896—July, 1923.

It is with very deep regret that we have learned of the death of Mr. J. J. Prest.

Usually when we have been called to record in these pages the passing of one of our members our sorrow has been for a young life called away from the day's work before the task was well begun. Different must be our feeling as we think of the death of Mr. Prest. His life's work finished in the fullness of time, he was spared for a period of rest and preparation in the evening of his life. And yet our sorrow is none the less sincere. Those whom we esteem are never old enough for us to lose unmoved; and, besides, it seems so very short a time since he was moving about among us scarcely changed, to all outward appearance, from the days of his active prime.

Mr. Prest's task cannot have been an easy one. In the nineties of the last century, after twenty years of compulsory elementary education, it was felt that the time had come for a stride forward along the lines of nationally organised higher education. The period was one of experiment and transition and therefore fertile in its own peculiar difficulties and problems. In addition to these, Mr. Prest would have, doubtless, difficulties and anxieties of his own—troubles unknown to his pupils within the school and unappreciated outside.

But if the life of a good schoolmaster must, of necessity, be fraught with anxiety and care, he may look for a reward which cannot be bought with money. A good schoolmaster lives in hearts he has left behind in a richer sense than is the common lot, for he has moulded and influenced successive generations of boys at their most impressionable age,—generations which have remained ever young as he himself has grown older. More fortunate, too, than most, he may hope that as the years pass his life's work will be judged with the greater sympathy and understanding which come with age and experience.

This reward, we are assured, will be Mr. Prest's. To many Old Stocktonians scattered all over the world the memory of school which will come first to mind will be the assembly in the gymnasium with the quiet and dignified figure of their Headmaster on the balcony. All these will learn with sadness and with a stirring of memory of his death and will join us in the earnest sympathy which we extend to Mrs. Prest and to her three Stocktonian sons.

Concerning Ourselves.

The Association may be congratulated on its good fortune in securing the services (for a third session) of Mr. C. W. Bond as Old Boy President. His generous devotion on our behalf of time he can ill spare amid multifarious activities and his distinguished leadership we are grateful and proud to accept.

We offer our congratulations to Mr. Nicholls on entering the married state, and wish him every happiness. The important event took place during the Summer holidays; and it was the pleasure of the Staff to make an appropriate presentation in honour of the occasion on resuming after the summer recess.

During the past year, school successes were as solid as ever, though unfortunately without many outstanding individual triumphs. R. Gedling brought us honour in winning a Scholarship of £50 for three years at Hull University College. This he followed with the Edgar Allen Scholarship of £100 for three years at Sheffield University: crowning his achievement with a State Scholarship in July.

C. Urwin, School Swimming Champion (at the age of fifteen) for the third year in succession gained the Junior Boys 50 yards Championship of Northumberland and Durham, and in July retained his title of 200 yards Junior River Champion, Stockton A.S.C. He promises to be the finest swimmer we have ever had.

No less than four old or present pupils are now playing for the Stockton First XV, and as many for the Second; a very gratifying state of affairs indeed, and a proper one too.

This Summer it was our turn to act as hosts at the Inter-School Sports Meeting, which took place in the pleasant surroundings of the Cricket Field on a glorious June evening, and proved as happy an event as when held under the auspices of any other of the competing Schools. For the first time there was a trophy to be competed for—a cup which we are happy to think of as the gift of an Old Stocktonian. There was, of course, a tinge of disappointment for us in that we had to occupy a lowly place in the final order of placing. Unfortunately too few of our boys take the School Sports earnestly enough: too few take up serious training and there are too few to whom we can look to provide a team which will worthily represent us at the Inter-School Meeting. We hope that the spirit of our boys will see that this is remedied and that the Cup comes to us.

Life members of the Association continue to rise steadily in numbers. There are now no less than 86. We should never have thought this possible. It is pleasing to note that several members we had lost sight of have returned during the past year.

We should be glad if foreign members would acknowledge receipt of the magazine. Each year a number are returned through the dead-letter office, and we have no means of knowing whether the remainder do or do not arrive at their destinations.

At least three Old Boys are acting as organists in the district ; namely, J. H. Maddock at Thornaby Parish Church. S. C. Bragg at St. Peter's Stockton, and a very young Old Boy, W. R. T. Marriott at Stockton Parish Church. All are more than mere executants ; men of discriminating knowledge and high ideals, content with nothing that is not of the finest quality.

School Sports.

The weather forecast for Friday, June 12th, 1936, told us there would be some slight occasional rain and later it would be fine and warm. It was fine and warm later—but it was three or four days later !

The programme had been considerably recast and the age classification altered so that those under 13 were classed as junior, 13 to 15 as middle, and over 15 as senior. This was a further step in the direction of providing a steady progress for a keen boy right through the school, with the hope that, if he showed any promise, he would aim high for inter-school class. We have deplored before the wastage which results from boys ceasing to keep up athletic training and competition after 14½. It is hoped that the extension of the middle school age to 15 will help them on to senior events at 16 and over in the year following.

Times and distances in senior events were pathetically poor, but the slithery condition of the turf on sports day furnished a modicum of excuse. Still a cricket ball throw of more than 20 yards short of record, and a high jump some 6 inches down take some explaining away ! A House Relay Race for each age division was an addition to the programme, and was taken up with great keenness.

Considering the uncheery weather the attendance of friends was very encouraging and the tea tent was well patronised.

Mrs. J. Spark very kindly presented the Cups, Prizes and Medals at the end of the day.

Rugby, 1935-36.

This season, a decided improvement has been shown in the School XV, despite the fact that five of the original team left during the season. At last we have begun to win matches; two notable victories being against Middlesbro' 3rds (15-5) and Middlesbro' H.S. (9-5). These "local derby" victories were the result of a much better team spirit than had hitherto been seen.

Cricket, 1936.

Once again, we had a most enjoyable season. Out of five matches played, the First XI claimed only one victory. Twice, however, we were most unfortunate in losing a race with the clock with victory in our grasp, namely against West Hartlepool S.S. and the Grammar School. The team as a whole played well together, and, with a little more steadiness in the batting, would have given a much better account of itself. Dixon and C. Hill were most successful with the bat, the latter in particular being most consistent. As a bowler, too, Hill distinguished himself, and, along with Robinson, shared the bowling honours. The team was usually selected from the above-named players and Byers, Watson, Gillespie, Haile, Coulson, Race, Coates and Curry.

The Second XI, although unable to claim a victory out of three matches played, gave quite a good account of itself.

HOUSE CRICKET MATCHES.

In the preliminary round Blue beat Brown, Green beat Red. The final between Blue and Green was spoiled by heavy rain which made cricket almost impossible. The match finished with honours even, both houses scoring 50 for 6 wickets.

Tennis Tournament, 1936.

There was a very pleasing entry for the tournament this year—twenty-eight boys in all contesting the first round. The most notable features of the tournament were the number of entries from the junior forms and the excellent display of sportsmanship throughout.

The most surprising feature of all was the defeat of J. Nicholson, a "seeded" player, at the hands of Williams.

From the semi-final, M. B. Dixon progressed to the final by beating J. Beaumont 6-1, 6-1, and after a hard match D. W. Byers overcame Williams 7-5, 6-2.

The final round produced some very good play, and with R. Gedling as umpire, the match proved to be a very hard-fought battle, and eventually D. W. Byers became Tennis Champion of 1936 by beating M. B. Dixon 6-3, 6-4.

Chess.

The number of entrants for the tournament for the "A. W. Welch" Chess Shield was somewhat small this year compared with previous occasions. Perhaps the fact that only ten boys entered was due to the mixed feelings of awe and admiration with which R. Gedling, the winner for the fourth time in succession, is regarded among the Chess enthusiasts of the School. Although the opposition in the persons of A. Swinburne (runner-up), W. Dixon, J. Beaumont and A. Hall was keen, he had but little difficulty in repeating his former triumphs. There are sighs of relief (not unmixed, however, with regret) among those who have sought to emulate him for so long, that this formidable antagonist has now gone to seek fresh laurels in other fields, where, we trust he will be even more successful.

Literary and Historical Society.

The Society has enjoyed a full and interesting session. The honour of first mention should perhaps be given to the Spark Cup Debate, in which the excellent performances of our secretary, Mr. Gedling, and his seconder, Mr. Coates, won for us the Spark Cup. The debate was on the subject of Treaty Revision.

Mr. E. J. Tinsley (Conservative) was thus declared elected as the parliamentary representative of the Ancient Borough of Pasapas.

Another new departure was a Dramatic Evening, at which, two one-act plays were produced: "A Night at an Inn," by Lord Dunsany, and "Rory Aforesaid," by James Brandane. The combination of thriller and farce found favour with a large audience.

Our regular special events were thoroughly successful. The opening Hat Night provided free membership for Mr. Dobby. First place in the competition for the Headmaster's Prize for the best speaker was awarded to Mr. Gedling. Messrs. Coates and Swinburne were runners-up. Prizes at the Magazine Night were won by Messrs. Byers and Dobby.

The House debating competition was closely contested. A "replay" was necessary before the Championship was finally won by the Brown House.

Other debates included the Fourth Form debate, and debates with the Girls' Secondary School, the Grammar School, Barnard Castle School (a most enjoyable innovation, this!) and with the Old Boys.

The Session was appropriately concluded on April 3rd, by the Annual Party, at which the frivolities of ping-pong, whist, etc., were suitably mixed with the more serious business of eating.

School Music.

Our Musical activities have been continued during the past year with rather more encouragement from the school as a whole.

With the very kind help of Mr. Kay, the House Musical Competition was held in November. Most unfortunately two of the Houses for some reason were unable to present the full number of

competitive items. This is just about comparable to a runner failing to turn out for a team race. This was a great disappointment to the House Captains who had worked nobly to make the best possible showing for their Houses. The Blue House, who gave some very good performances, were the winners—for the third year in succession. Attendances on Wednesday afternoons were better, but not so good as they should have been. Among the specially memorable performances we recall occasions when a trio (violin, 'cello and piano) played a Dvorak Slavonic Dance, a Debussy Arabesque, Saint Saëns' Danse Macabre, Ravel's L'Heure Espagnole, and a Handel Sonata da Camera—among other pieces; an afternoon when two violins and a piano played movements from Handel's Sonatas and a trio by Fasch which deserves to be better known; and the afternoon when Mr. J. M. Jones came and sang to us.

We were afraid that it was too much to hope that such excellent performers as Mr. L. Knox and Mr. H. Spottiswoode would be left to us indefinitely. Mr. Knox has been appointed solo 'cellist in the orchestra on the "Queen Mary," and Mr. Spottiswoode plays in the orchestra on the "Avila Star."

For their ever-willing kindness and their excellent performances we thank them sincerely and hope we may yet see and hear them on occasion. We offer also our sincere and grateful thanks to Mr. and Mrs. H. Russell, to Mr. J. Marshall and to Mr. J. M. Jones.

The School Orchestra have had some interesting practices and played on one of the Wednesday afternoons. At the Speech Day they played Handel's Music for the Royal Fireworks, La Favorita (Chaconne), Couperin, and a March by Schumann.

Perhaps it is permitted to relate how one distinguished member of the audience, after listening for the first three or four minutes, turned round to his neighbour behind and said with surprised enthusiasm: "But this is a good show!" The earnest conviction of the remark was worth more than much formal flattery. Nevertheless we think with sadness of the string orchestra which we *might* have if we could have attending for regular practices the many excellent players whom we have loved and lost.

School Journey.

There was no school journey to the continent this year, since, at the time when definite arrangements needed to be made, the international situation was distinctly unrestful and it seemed that circumstances might arise which might unduly prolong an unpropitious trip to Luxembourg. Since the French exchange is now more reasonable, it might be possible to arrange a few days in Normandy in 1937: time alone will show whether this will be possible.

In 1936 however no School party ventured further afield than York. We left the School at shortly after 8.0 a.m. and arrived at York at 10 o'clock. The morning was spent in a tour of Rowntree's Cocoa Works, where we were properly impressed with the hygienic efficiency of a well-organised modern factory and where we were regaled with refreshments during the tour and helped towards our departure by a present of a well selected box of chocolates and sweets.

After lunch in a suitable road-siding, the party proceeded to the Cathedral and Chapter Library, along the city walls from Bootham Bar to Goodram Gate and through the Shambles to Pavement. Here

we inspected the outside of the Merchant Adventurers' Hall and were told something about it by one of the York City Guides. This done, a visit was paid to the barbican at Walmgate Bar and the outside of the wall between there and Clifford's Tower was inspected. Our visit to the Guildhall was, however, somewhat cursory since the five-hundred-years-old woodwork was receiving a long-needed repair.

Thereafter *magistro fulminato* the party dispersed for a short time to permit of private shopping and rallied under the shadow of the Cathedral for the completion of the journey. There, seated in our coaches, we sucked milk "through a straw" and consumed the unexpended portion of the day's rations.

The returning pilgrimage wended its way home, via Gilling and Ampleforth, to Helmsley and Bilsdale. Here the buses halted at the top of a steep incline and here some of the younger members of the excursion found their keenest enjoyment of the day in frolicking over the moor and consuming immense quantities of bilberries. It may be for this reason that one well-known voyager arrived home with some of his provender still unfinished. A happy day!

School Speech Day, 1935.

Once again the Speech Day took place on what is reckoned a day of evil import—a Friday and the 13th of the month! Despite the ominous significance of such a date, however, the proceedings passed off with considerable éclat and the function was voted to be one of the most successful in the School's history.

This pleasant state of affairs was due in part to the outstanding results achieved by the School during the session 1935-36. As the Headmaster mentioned in his report, the School presented the highest number of candidates for the School Certificate which it has yet done and gained its highest percentage of passes. Then, too, the awards of Scholarships were also the highest; full details of these, it will be remembered, were published in last year's issue of the Year Book. But it was gratifying for all the members of the staff to realise that their efforts during the session had been crowned with such signal success, and his audience must have been in entire agreement with the Headmaster when he referred in grateful terms to the hard work put in by his colleagues.

The speaker of the evening was Professor Irvine Masson, Head of the Science Department, Durham University.

After congratulating the School on its splendid results, Professor Masson went on to express his sympathy with the schoolmaster's task. "It is," he said, "an extremely difficult one, for he has to work necessarily in the framework of a set scheme and within that framework must provide just as much for the keen and able boy, for the lazy and unable boy, and for that wholly mythical person, the average boy. No two boys are alike and no teacher since the world began has been able to put into a boy a capacity that was originally omitted. The function of a good school," he continued, "is the sorting out of boys instead of cramping them into one groove, and it was a proof and an example of the excellent work being done by the school that the long list of Old Boys' successes, comprising a great variety of occupations, shows how well they had been sorted out while still at school,

Professor Masson's address was much enjoyed and perhaps one of its chief virtues—and here we speak feelingly after a long experience of Prize Day Speeches—was its conciseness and shortness; all he said was very much to the point and was delivered with great raciness and humour.

Mr. Kay's Choir, as usual, distinguished itself, and Nutley, who had been awarded the Alderman Douthwaite Singing Prize, pleased the audience with his songs, as did also the Choir's rendering of Gustav Holst's "Sign of the Shipbuilders" and the arrangement by Geoffrey Shaw of the "Bay of Biscay" (with descant) in particular.

The various items by the School Orchestra were well performed and it is obvious that it is going from strength to strength. Many and flattering were the references made to it afterwards by various friends of the School and it was evident that the high standard of the music performed was appreciated.

After votes of thanks to Professor Masson and to the Mayor (Alderman Newton) who presided, the proceedings were wound up by the singing of "Jerusalem," in which the entire audience heartily joined.

Poor Children's Treat.

This event had perforce to be held early this year, to wit on the 20th December, but was ne'er a bit the less successful on that account. In addition to the usual round of feeding, fun and noise, we were able as a result of the kindness of Mr. Charles Ward, an Old Boy, to add to the entertainment a programme given by the Harmonica Band of the Stockton Social Service Centre,—generous in quantity, superior in

quality, and rapturously received by youthful guests and older workers. The kind offices of our liberal bandsmen friends, made the labours of our troupe of comedians somewhat less exacting, and, added to the time-approved attractions of wizardry and Punch and Judy and the visit of Santa, helped the time along in rare fashion.

To the very many Old Boys who by gifts of money and effort make possible this annual festival, our best thanks are due. Our President and Mrs. Bond, added the necessary touch of grace and geniality to consummate the success of a very happy evening.

The Eighteenth Annual Dinner.

A creditably large company of Old Boys stood about on the staircase of the "Metropole" on the 3rd of January, waiting for the dinner to begin. This year, in addition to the usual attractions of gorging, re-union, oratory and whatnot, the programme included a presentation. Eventually everyone arrived and we began.

If anyone is libelled in this ensuing record it is not really the fault of the recorder. His notes were in copying ink in a coat in which he got wet through, and when purple streaks are added to natural illegibility the results are odd. However, the proceedings were opened by the chairman who was brief and, the notes say, modest. He read letters from distinguished old boys who regretted that they could not come because they had married wives or lived in Johannesburg. We then sang some Latin and the Ode to Tobacco—the other school song. Mr. Lax, of Redcar, who went to our Higher Grade School some forty years ago, told us about his schooldays. I am not sure whether he said that there was originally a swimming bath in the basement or merely that there was going to be. It is only by following this system that the Trustees, working with very limited funds, can hope to do the greatest possible good to the greatest possible number.

In two or three cases, however, which are at present exercising the minds of the Trustees, little or no effort is being made to repay comparatively large sums which have been lent in all good faith.

The Trustees, therefore, feel that a time may come when it may be necessary to ask the parent Association to put aside the cloak of secrecy which has always enveloped the Benevolent Fund and to allow the light of day to be shed on certain transactions into which that Fund has entered.

In Memoriam.

MARK HENDERSON JONES left us about fourteen years ago. We remember him as a quiet lad, gentle in his ways, and earnest in all he undertook; one who was anxiously willing always to make best use of the opportunities the school afforded. It was with great regret that we learned of his dangerous illness and the long and painful suffering it involved, suffering quietly and patiently borne without murmur or complaint. Almost to the end he looked back with joy on days at school and found some solace in the midst of pain and weariness in the pleasant memories they afforded; indeed the joy of these memories was the subject of his last sad letter to us, written a fortnight before his passing.

Somewhat older was JOSEPH ASHALL ROBINSON, though still a young man. He was one of those whose boyhood ceased on leaving school, who in the days of the war put off his schoolboy clothes to don the uniform of one of the services, in his case the Air Force,—and in a measure this service may have contributed towards his early death. After the war he entered the service of Messrs. Forsythe, contractors, and for the past eleven years had acted as representative of the Danish Bacon Company. His passing last July was deeply regretted by all who knew him, as well Old Boys, school friends of days gone by as friends who in the commercial world had learnt to esteem and honour him.

HUGH CUNNINGTON was a pupil in the years immediately following the war. He was a singularly thoughtful and gentlemanly boy,—perhaps almost too much given to quiet reflection. After gaining his Higher Certificate he proceeded to Durham University where he took his degree with honours in history. A little later he took a course in Art, for which he had always shown a delicate taste, and gained the Art Master's qualification. Thus admirably equipped he devoted himself to teaching and was engaged latterly at Lawrence Sheriff's school, Rugby. It was with the pain which comes when we have lost a personal friend that we learnt just after *The Stocktonian* had gone to press last year of his untimely death.

VINCENT LEO DEE was the youngest of four brothers who have been educated at the school. The eldest brother, Austin Dee, was an enthusiastic original member of the Old Stocktonians. He, alas! died also before his time. Now the youngest has died too, the victim of an unfortunate accident which occurred at the foot of Parliament Street on the last night of the old year. It is sad to think that his lameness may have been the cause which prevented all chance of escape.

We, the friends of these our Old Boys, offer to their parents and relatives our deepest sympathy for a loss all the more cruel because the promise and hope of youth has been denied fulfilment.

RULES.

Old Stocktonians' Association.

Revised October, 1929.

1.—The name of the Association shall be the "Old Stocktonians."

The "Old Stocktonians" aims at continuing friendships and preserving that spirit of comradeship which ought to exist among those who have been educated at the same school. These aims are to be achieved by means of social, recreative, and educational pursuits.

2.—The Association shall be open to the Old Boys of the Stockton Secondary School and of the late Higher Grade School. Past and present members of the staff are also eligible.

3.—The government of the Association shall be vested in three Presidents, six Vice-Presidents, a Treasurer, two Secretaries and a Committee of sixteen, together with the Secretary of each sub-section.

(a) The present and retired headmasters shall be Presidents ex-officio. The third shall be elected annually.

(b) All the other officials shall be elected annually.

(c) A member holding any office shall be eligible for re-election in the following year, in the same or any capacity.

(d) In Committee seven shall form a quorum.

(e) The Committee shall have power to co-opt any member or members at their discretion for the time being for any particular purpose.

4.—The Committee shall have power to refuse membership to any applicant for admission or to ask any member to resign (after investigation by the Committee and confirmation by a general meeting), whose conduct they consider such as to militate against the welfare of the Association.

5.—Each Section shall be self-governing and self-supporting. The Committee, however, shall have power to grant financial aid to any section.

Each Section shall submit its programme to the General Committee for approval.

6.—The Annual Subscription shall be one shilling for the first two years after leaving School—after that it shall be two shillings—payable to any member of the Committee, before January 1st. In lieu of an Annual Subscription, a Life Subscription of twenty-five shillings may be made.

7.—These Rules shall be altered only at the Annual General Meeting, and then only by a two-thirds majority; all motions of such alteration to be in the hands of the Secretaries four days before the date of such meeting.

8.—The Annual General Meeting shall be held in September or October.

9.—The Financial Year shall end on the 31st December.
