

School Sports.

June 22nd, 1933, was an ideal day for the Sports, ideal both for competitors and spectators, and although later on Jupiter Tonans made himself heard he did not come to the field, and we saw nothing at all of his brother Pluvius.

Under such ideal conditions it was to be expected that records would be attacked, and some good performances resulted. G. A. Rowe went all the way for the mile, and succeeded in lowering A. W. Walton's record of last year by 10 seconds. S. Walker was throwing

the cricket ball but was unable to improve on his throw of last year, so the record passed to N. R. Dodds, who threw well over 100 yards with the wind, and whose throw with and against the wind was returned at 99 yds. 6 ins. Such performances as these are able to hold up their heads against the usual Public School records.

We regret that there was an unauthorised protrusion of a hurdle over the track, which caused trouble in the Inter-School Relay Race. We hope the Grammar School will show their disapproval by giving us a good beating next year.

For the first time for several years alterations were made in the programme. The wheelbarrow race and the three-legged race, which have figured on the programme in alternate years, and which really owed their presence there to the necessity for providing for preparatory forms which no longer exist, have disappeared, and a straight 80 yards race for juniors under 13 has been added; long jumps for both seniors and juniors have been introduced, and the hurdles which was formerly 100 yards becomes a 120 yards race. Thus our programme now becomes nearer to the form of the usual Public School programme, and it is hoped that the events will form a more adequate preparation for the Inter-School Sports. By the way, our new hurdles were much admired by those who know as they glistened white in the sun. We hope to take advantage of them to introduce a junior hurdles at the lower height.

J. H. Gardner was the Junior Champion, and N. R. Dodds with four firsts was the Senior Champion. This last accounts for the rumour of the mysterious figure seen running and leaping in the mists of dawn in the Park at Fishburn.

The arrangements for feeding the assembled multitudes worked as well as usual, and we wish to thank all those who helped with gifts of food or with personal service to ensure the smooth working and financial success of this very important side-issue of the afternoon's activities.

We were particularly pleased to welcome the Mayoress,—the wife of a distinguished Old Stocktonian—who came and distributed the Cups, Medals and Certificates.

It still, alas! is necessary to say that the sportsmanship of the school requires a larger entry in senior track events. What is required is that boys who are only a little over the senior age and who have little expectation of winning should be sporting enough to enter and *do their very best*.

Inter-School Sports.

The sixth inter-school sports were held on the High School Field, Middlesbrough, on Friday, June 30th, 1933.

Though we cannot say we are yet satisfied with our showing, we were certainly more cheerful when the sports were over than we have been for the past two years. The performances at these sports are so excellent that a school is not disgraced by occupying a somewhat lowly position. For example, the professional timekeeper was obviously impressed with the result when he returned 10.25 as the time for the 100 yards, and we could not but reflect that the *Times Educational Supplement*, some three weeks before, had produced a photograph of the finish of the 100 yards in a Public Schools meeting, where the time was given as 10.3 secs.

R. N. Dodds ran very pluckily for his points, and we rather thought that it was hard luck that he did not get a third in the Hurdles as well as in the 100 yards and Long Jump. But after all it was G. A. Rowe who gained the plaudits of the multitude. He won the mile in 4 min. 59.4 secs., just 4 secs. outside the record, and this he did after having had a three-hour practical examination in both morning and afternoon. Well Run, Sir! Our hopes for next year are pitched high.

Inter-School Cross Country Run, 1933.

The race this year took place at Middlesbrough, and was won by Coatham with 86 points. The other Schools were Darlington 113, Stockton 116, Middlesbrough 231. Rowe ran very well for the school and finished second in the field. The following represented the school—Gedling, Green, Henderson, Hill, Lambton, Lee, Lloyd, McKechnie, Newton, Rowe.

Swimming Sports.

The sports were held on October 15th, 1933. This was certainly Stirling's year. The nearest approach to his 20 points appears to be C. H. O'Grady's 16 points in 1925. But it must be admitted that in races requiring speed he was never pressed and the times for Senior Events were lamentably short of records. Nevertheless, his achievement in beating by 28 feet J. Connors' record for swimming under water, which has stood since 1914, was altogether outstanding. We believe that the distance has never been beaten at the baths.

The youngsters were full of beans and broke three of the time records. We should like to mention specially the performances of the brothers Race and of C. Urwin.

The President of the Old Stocktonians—who incidentally is Mayor of Stockton—Ald. C. W. Allison, presented the medal and certificates and seemed to enjoy himself very much.

House Football Cup.

The House Football Cup was won by Blue House, who throughout the competition were undefeated. Their success was mostly due to Menzies (their captain), Salmon, Adams and McKechnie. Green House, for whom Fenny and Stirling as defenders and G. Clark in the attack played well, nearly checked their advance but were finally beaten by six goals to five. Green and Red House finished level for second place with three points each, compared with Blue's six, but Green had the better goal average in spite of the good work done by E. Clark in goal, Medlock outside-left and Shutt—a determined centre-half for Red House. Brown House brought up the rear without a single point, although Reed always tried hard to inspire the team to further efforts.

Soccer, 1932-33.

Although season 1932-33 was not quite such a successful one as its predecessor, it cannot be said that we were disgraced. Out of fourteen games played, nine were won, two drawn and three lost, whilst 60 goals were scored against 38 by our opponents, the chief scorers being Dodds with twenty-three and G. Clark with nine. As can be seen from the number of goals conceded, the defence contributed its full share to the success of the team.

A new fixture was obtained with Darlington Grammar School, but we were soundly beaten by nine goals to one. The other two games lost were against Middlesbrough High School, but only after two closely contested games. The drawn matches were against West Hartlepool Secondary School and our local rivals the Grammar School. The usual team consisted of E. Clark, Stirling, Fenny, McKechnie, Salmon, Robinson, G. Clark, Reed, Dodds, Adams, Medlock.

The Second Eleven lost only two games out of seven, and here again Middlesbrough were our conquerors. Thirty-eight goals were scored against fourteen, the principal marksmen being Sutherland and Ruddock.

Rugby Football, 1932-33.

The battle song which goaded on the "Old Brigade" was unsung, enthusiasm waned, and to support the school was regarded as a painful task. Only once did enthusiasm kindle and glory of glories, the school defeated Middlesbrough High School by sixteen points to fourteen. All other matches were lost, though only on one occasion—against West Hartlepool—did the score exceed fifteen points against. This low figure was due to the untiring efforts of the full-back Shutt, who knows what it is,—and what it feels like—to "go low and hard," and who has been recognised by the officials of the Middlesbrough Rugby Club as a sound full-back.

Rugby House matches proved a notable success and atoned somewhat for lack of enthusiasm elsewhere. A fine climax culminated in the defeat of the Blue House by the Red, by one try, which E. Clarke—who of course hails from Fishburn—converted from a position not far from the touch.

Morgan (alias Avoirdupois), Henderson and Reed gained recognition by the County selection Committee, and we are still wondering why Dodds, the captain of the Soccer, does not realise his capacity as a potential County right-wing three-quarter.

Cricket.

The School Cricket XI achieved only moderate success during the 1933 season. Of the eleven matches played, five were won, four lost, and two drawn. Two close games were contested with the Stockton and Norton Thursday XIs., the former being defeated by one wicket, while against the latter the school lost by the same margin. A team of Old Boys was soundly defeated.

The batting of the team was, on the whole, excellent, and several good scores were put together. There was no appreciable "tail," and a good balance was shown between the sedate and the lively. The more orthodox batsmen—Wilson, Shields, McKechnie and Kirtley—were counteracted by the "grand slam" in the persons of Sutherland, Walker, Reed, Dodds, Stirling and Fenny. The attack was mainly in the hands of Sutherland, Wilson, Shields and Jacques, who were ably supported by an efficient fielding side, Dodds and Wilson deserving special mention for their work in the slips.

A second eleven played three matches and won one. Against Gisborough Grammar School second eleven, Turner distinguished himself with a brilliant 53 not out.

Tennis.

The remarkable stretch of sunny weather during the summer months this year provided ample opportunities for tennis enthusiasts to concentrate on the School Tennis Championship, and entries were as good as usual.

The Tennis Trophy was secured by A. Green. The runner-up, F. Trotter, played consistently and well throughout the match. It is pleasing to note that more younger boys took an active interest this year; indeed, in the Ropner Park, on almost any evening after 4 o'clock, one could see youngsters either engaged in friendly play or keenly contesting for places in the championship.

This keenness makes the abandoning of the Annual Match against the Girls' School all the more regrettable, as it deprives us of any chance to reply to their too frequent victories in past years.

Chess Tournament.

Eleven boys entered this year for the "A. W. Welch" Shield, and a high standard of play was attained. The veterans amazed all by their display of grave and serious thought, whilst the most promising array of young players strove to imitate the learned attitudes of their elders. Some interesting play was seen but, in spite of the efforts of Metcalfe and Swinburne, the four more experienced players met in the semi-final. Here the deep-mouthed rancour of Warwick overcame his opponent after a bitter struggle, and the yelping pertinacity of Gedling's methods proved too much for the experienced Neale. In the final Warwick met Gedling for the third time and, in the cold light of a Sports' Day morning, the latter won his first victory. The shield thus left the Aitken family after having honourably stayed there for five years.

The "Lit & His." continued to exist in 1932-3 and added to its laurels by sending a team to capture the Spark Cup of the Stockton branch of the League of Nations Union. Further, the Warwick family distinguished itself for Guy Warwick was elected honorary member while his father gave the society a most amusing and inspiring lecture on "Rupert Brooke & His Poetry." We have also to record the longest lecture of the longest traveller in the history of the Society for Dr. Spurdle came from New Zealand via Consett to tell us about his country and liked talking to us so well that he went on for nearly two hours; and we listened patiently and found it very good. We were also fortunate enough to persuade Rev. A. J. Bott to show us his pictures and describe his recent visit to Palestine. So we were lucky in our lecturers and take this opportunity of thanking them.

The debates also reached a high level, the speaking of Kirtley in particular being warmly praised in the final of the Spark Cup. Sutherland also attracted attention while Clark and Stirling were enthusiastic supporters of their houses. Red House won the Shield.

The Society has to thank Menzies for his services as secretary.

School Journey to Pickering.

It was not possible to arrange an outing for the Junior School this year, but a party of Seniors went to Rievaulx, Helmsley and Pickering. Times are bad and the price was high so even this was not as well supported as might have been. Nevertheless, those who went got a very pleasant afternoon and free entrance to three ancient monuments; so we hope they enjoyed it. We wish to thank Miss Foscef, Pickering Grammar School, for showing us round Pickering Castle.

School Speech Day.

To the present writer it seems only the other day that he was attempting a description of the 1930-31 Speech Day ; but twelve full months must have gone by for here he is now busy with the 1931-32 function. One reason why the time seems so short is doubtless because, after all, one Speech Day is very much like another. There is the same prize table, laden with the same sort of prize books ; there is the same rather jolly atmosphere of expectation and excitement, especially on the part of those about to receive prizes ; there is the same, or nearly the same, platform party ; there is the same recapitulation of examination results, etc.; and, very often, there is the same sort of Address to the same audience, with, very often, the same jest about " never winning a prize in my life....."

So I need not enumerate the examination results, excellent though they were for 1930-31 ; they are given in detail on another page. Nor need I here dwell on the successes of the Old Boys, for are they not also detailed on another page ? Let no reader imagine, of course, that in thus summarily dealing with the Headmaster's Report, we are not, all of us, more than proud of these fine performances ; still, the " clou " of the evening was the Address, which, I hasten to add, did not contain that weary old joke (*sic*) referred to above !

Sir Holberry Mensforth, K.C.B., C.B.E., was the speaker. He began by declaring that if education was the eternal debt owed to the coming generation by the present, then so far as our School was concerned " paid " was being put to that debt in a very handsome manner. It was therefore the duty of the rising generation to take full and proper advantage of the educational facilities now being offered to it. When he started work at an early age, he said, so many opportunities did not exist. When he entered as a boy a big Drawing Office in this country, draughtsmen of every nationality were engaged. By their side worked British draughtsmen, who could produce results in every way superior to those accomplished by Swiss, French or Germans, and that with one-tenth of the figuring. And such is our Education to-day that we are producing young men now, whose technical attainments are still equal, if not superior, to those produced by any other nation in the world. He did not believe that all men are equal. One boy may have one talent, another have three. The thing that mattered to the boy with one talent was to what percentage was he going to develop it and use it. If he developed 75% and the fellow with three talents developed 50%, then the former was the better of the two. He was certain that the world was moving forward, even amid its present troubles. He did not know, he said, what the answer to these troubles would be, but this he did know, namely, that the answer would be found in Britain. Britain had taught the rest of the world not only technical and scientific things, but also the value of decent behaviour and fine commercial morality. The responsibility of carrying on this tradition rested with the coming generation. He was quite convinced that there was a future for every boy in his audience, and he urged them to believe that there were greater things in the world than money-making. The best work in the world was, after all, not done for money and never would be. To be strong and steadfast, to live truly and righteously, to build up one's character in strength and purpose—these were the important things. If the coming generation kept such ideals before them, then there would be no fear of the future, or of the country of which we were all part.

Mr. Kay's pupils, as usual, distinguished themselves, and their singing, as well as the items by the School Orchestra, justly evoked appreciative applause.

It will be a subject of regret to everyone connected with the School that this was the last appearance of Mr. Roger in his capacity as Chairman. We all owe to him an immense debt of gratitude for the interest, help and sympathy he has always afforded to the School and all its undertakings, and we rejoice to know that, although no longer Chairman, he yet remains one of our Governors.

To Alderman Newton, the new Chairman, we tender our congratulations; he has the advantage of having a fine model to follow in his predecessor.

We also congratulate Alderman Douthwaite on being elected Vice-Chairman, and we note, with much appreciation, that in order to celebrate his new office, he has presented a special prize for Singing to the School.

Music.

Our kind friends have enabled us to maintain the high standard of our Wednesday evening performances. Where so many fine works were well performed we may be excused for remembering with special delight a magnificent rendering of Elgar's violin sonata, and delightful performances of Lalo's 'cello Sonata, Saint-Saen's Trio No. 1, Haydn Quartet in C (for the Centenary), and single Quartet movements by Schubert, Beethoven and Tschaikowsky. Of the instrumentalists we are greatly indebted to Mr. H. Spottiswoode, Mr. L. Knox, Mr. and Mrs. H. Russell, Mr. M. Scott, Mrs. J. Livingston (another of those wonderful Harp performances). In addition our thanks are due to Mr. J. M. Jones, Dr. W. Idris Jones, and Mr. W. H. Frazer, who sang to us.

Mr. Gavin Kay again was kind enough to help with the House Competition and to act as judge. His comments are always very valuable to us all and we thank him for the trouble he so willingly takes. The Brown House were outstanding winners; the remaining Houses were only separated by two or three points.

The Orchestra has continued to flourish and on Speech Day performed a suite arranged from John Blow's music to Venus and Adonis, an Air in C by Arthur Somervell, and a jolly march for the not-quite-so-high-brows. The chief difficulty is the departure of our good players and the difficulty of replacing them. Early youth is the time to master a musical instrument, and we wish parents of boys in lower forms would consider the possibility of allowing them to learn an orchestral instrument.

OLD BOYS' REPORTS.

The Eleventh Annual Lecture.

Wednesday, the 22nd February, 1933, proved of all days in a dismal month the most forbidding, and brave indeed were those faithful ones who forced themselves from the cheery comfort of the fireside to face the really dangerous walking that led to the Jubilee Hall. Many of our audience had come miles, and we think that it is

to say no more than the truth, when we state that all felt themselves well rewarded for their fortitude. Some asserted that the Lecture, "Flying alone round the World," by the Hon. Mrs. Victor Bruce, was finer than any of its predecessors. Certain it is that the narrative of dangers faced in an enforced descent on the desert coast of the Persian gulf, and in flying over the mountains of Indo-China and later over the Rockies, held us all enthralled, even though the "thrillers" of modern entertainment must have tended to make us rather exacting in our demands in the way of excitement.

The President of the Association (the Mayor) occupied the chair with his customary genial charm and efficiency.

Must we add that the proceeds were somewhat less than we have learnt to hope for—namely something over £4?—and that Association Funds and the Benevolent Fund smiled somewhat wanly at such slender augmentation. Hard times doubtless were in some measure responsible for our disappointment but more probably the competition of cheaper lectures backed by bodies financially of greater magnitude than our diminutive selves, as we were somewhat scathingly informed by some of our members.

Film Society.

This venture, which we had hoped might succeed the lecture. we have had to abandon, since only twenty-six of our 600 members felt attracted by the idea. The subscription of 5/- will be returned to those who forwarded it.

Poor Children's Treat.

Only one treat was held this year, but from the point of view of cheeriness it was in no way less distinguished than its predecessors. On this occasion we worked in association with the Committee appointed by the Mayor to co-ordinate efforts of this kind and entertained some of the worthiest and most charming little guests we have ever had, who, though somewhat over-awed and timid, soon thawed out and, if somewhat less boisterous than we have known, enjoyed themselves thoroughly.

There were rather fewer Old Boys present on this occasion to keep the fun going as it ought to be kept going, hence the burden fell rather heavily on the little band who worked very hard to this end. We should be happy to welcome a few more in this glad cause, in the Gymnasium, on Saturday, Dec. 23rd, at 6 p.m.

The Stocktonians' Fifteenth Annual Dinner.

As the Town Hall clock began to strike the hour of 11 p.m. on the evening of Thursday, December 22nd, 1932, our President rose and told us that he had received very strict instructions that we must dissolve and disappear at 11 o'clock precisely, though he, personally, would have been happy to prolong so enjoyable a gathering for another couple of hours.

The sentiment implied has since received abundant confirmation, some diners declaring that for them this had been the most enjoyable Old Stocktonians' function they had ever attended, while others would only allow that it was the most delightful *dinner*. We think that the increase in numbers helped to make everything go with a swing, but though the sixty present marks an advance on last year we have always thought that, for a society as far flung as ours, a hundred ought to be the minimum attendance at the dinner. We were pleased to see a goodly proportion of our fine young members present and hope that they will make it widely known that Stocktonian dinners are not dry-as-dust formal affairs but jolly social gatherings, and so more members will be induced to resolve that no weight of Christmas expenses shall keep them away in future.

It would be unfair not to admit that Mr. Horace Drinkle had no small share in making the gentlemen merry. Mr. Drinkle is an Old Stocktonian and a genuine artist and nobly responded to a perfectly outrageous number of calls on his kindness and his talent. We thank him.

Of course, there were some speeches—quite good ones too. For example, Dr. Idris Jones, in proposing the toast of the Association, made a good one, though he did not indulge in recondite philosophies but told us pleasant little stories. He became also self revealing but slandered himself when he said that he had little talent for music, seeing that he sang several times most acceptably and well. Nevertheless we could easily understand that he prided himself not so much on his science—though that was his chosen career—as on his Cambridge rugger blue and Welsh international cap. He protested against the modern tendency to make sport a thing deadly serious instead of a recreation. He pleaded guilty to being an out-door man in all respects, a lover of mountains and wild open spaces: but he was a good hater too, as shown by his loathing of crab, lobster, and insane speed. As he quoted to us both French and Latin, and promised to give to boys and Old Boys what help and advice on rugger matters he could, he left us with the impression of a very accomplished and kindly personality, and, if he did tell us what might go on his tombstone, we hope it will be long before it will be necessary to give instructions to any monumental sculptor on his account.

Mr. F. Laws, of King's, Cambridge, also made an excellent speech when he proposed the toast of the school. It is true that he made it in the Oxford manner—at least we have always understood that Cambridge was *much* less flippant and much more deadly in earnest. Mr. Laws chided the writer of the account of the dinner last year for “daring to hint a delicate disapproval” of some of the speeches. Now it is only a year or two since Mr. Cohen mocked with lambent irony at what he considered the fulsome laudation bestowed upon every speechmaker. Anyhow, this year's scribe refuses to hint a disapproval of Mr. Laws, who was delicately humorous and appropriately epigrammatic—did he not call Bacon a bore and father on him the aphorism that eating maketh a full man, drinking an eloquent man? His memories of school were already becoming mellow and if not exactly rosy were at least delicately pink—for he could not dissociate school from the memory of carbolic soap. He also said other things even more to the point than these and altogether carried through his difficult task quite brilliantly.

And, although these were the two chief invited speakers, it must not be assumed that the other speeches were uninteresting. The President was in excellent form. The connecting links which he

supplied were made the occasion for sparkling *obiter dicta*, and his puns – well his puns were as outstanding as ever. More seriously he spoke in the vein of his speech to which reference was made in the Stocktonian of last year, and told us that earnest co-operation and helpfulness were as necessary as ever and that the country had need of the best efforts of its best brains.

Dr. Kinnes, replying to the toast of the school, was able to assure us that, in his opinion, the present scholars contained among them a due proportion of embryonic great men. He looked forward to the more commodious conditions of the proposed new school and hoped that when we were installed therein the availability of playing fields might lead to the revival of the Old Stocktonians' Team.

Nor must we forget that Mr. Roger again expressed surprise that so many younger people should wish to have an octogenarian at their board on these occasions. He may be assured that a fine old English gentleman of the genuine Victorian mould is a pleasing sight to see and a model which more restless and less happy times have neither superannuated nor bettered. We hope to have him with us for a good number of years yet.

And so we parted. Of how the little table downstairs came to be broken it skills not here to speak. Suffice it to say that the evening was so enjoyable that we expect to see all who were there present at the next dinner, and we hope that many others will come and judge for themselves.

Benevolent Fund.

The past year saw the resources of this most useful section of the Old Boys' activities still further reduced, a balance of £27 in September, 1932, falling to a mere £14 or £15 in 1933.

Owing to the comparative financial failure of the Annual Lecture, no income was obtained from this source, and the Fund had, therefore, to depend on the repayment of loans and on an occasional subscription from a more than usually affluent Old Boy.

In the latter connection, an extremely pleasing feature was a gift of £5 from an Old Boy, who took this method of showing his gratitude for the immense benefit which the Fund had been to him.

The calls on the Fund were so many, that it proved quite impossible to meet them in the generous way which the Trustees would have liked. Indeed, in one particular case, little or no help could have been given had it not been for the kindly assistance of a prominent Old Stocktonian who, not for the first time, showed his interest and practical sympathy in the Association affairs.

Times are, of course, very difficult, but it seems fairly evident that if the Benevolent Fund is to function in the future, further sources of income must be found.

This point has for some time troubled the Trustees who view their dwindling resources with a good deal of concern.

In any scheme that is brought forward then, the Trustees look for the co-operation of all Old Boys who, they feel, will not willingly allow the Benevolent Fund to lapse when a common effort would enable it to continue its useful and beneficent labours.

Obituary.

A heavy task is ours when we must record the deaths of members of the Association. Since our numbers are large, it is not to be wondered at that Death takes his toll each year, but we are not an old Association and the school itself counts less than forty years, so that those whom we lose, we lose untimely with the promise of their youth unfulfilled. To us these are not merely names from a list, but friends whom we have known for four years or more in school, and whose careers we have seen begun, but alas! cut short before they could come to full fruition.

We learnt, too late for mention in last year's Stocktonian, of the death of John Lancaster Smith. He had hoped to be an actor in light comedy and had made some progress in his profession. We remember a delightful letter we once received from him from Paris, where he was performing with an English company. He leaves behind the sweet memory of a singularly kindly and sunny personality.

On March 23rd, 1933, died Jack Jobling. He was the youngest of four fine brothers, all Old Stocktonians. His brother Victor had gone before him; his name is on the school War Memorial. Jack died after a long and weary illness. We shall miss his splendid manly figure and ready smile.

It is only a short five years since H. L. Robinson left us for the work of the world and the passing of one who was still almost one of our boys, at practically the very outset of his career, is very painful to record. He had worked on the Committee for four of those five years and was always an enthusiastic worker for the Association. Modest and retiring, quiet and cheerful, and patient and uncomplaining under the shadow of the trouble which took him from us, he was greatly loved and will be greatly missed.

And with these young people we must join another friend of the school; but this time one full of years and ripe in experience. All older Stocktonians will remember Mr. R. Bowery, caretaker of the school from its opening in January, 1896, till his retirement after the end of the War. He passed away—suddenly at the last—on Feb. 17th, 1933, aged 89. If ever a man lived for his work and did it with all his ability it was he. The school was ever his pride, and he would frequently stop us to ask how people were and how the "old place" was getting on.

To the friends of these our friends we extend our sympathy in their sorrow which we share.

"To live in hearts we leave behind is not to die."

RULES.

Old Stocktonians' Association.

Revised October, 1929.

1.—The name of the Association shall be the "Old Stocktonians."

The "Old Stocktonians" aims at continuing friendships and preserving that spirit of comradeship which ought to exist among those who have been educated at the same school. These aims are to be achieved by means of social, recreative, and educational pursuits.

2.—The Association shall be open to the Old Boys of the Stockton Secondary School and of the late Higher Grade School. Past and present members of the staff are also eligible.

3.—The government of the Association shall be vested in three Presidents, six Vice-Presidents, a Treasurer, two Secretaries and a Committee of sixteen, together with the Secretary of each sub-section.

- (a) The present and retired headmasters shall be Presidents ex-officio. The third shall be elected annually.
- (b) All the other officials shall be elected annually.
- (c) A member holding any office shall be eligible for re-election in the following year, in the same or any capacity.
- (d) In Committee seven shall form a quorum.
- (e) The Committee shall have power to co-opt any member or members at their discretion for the time being for any particular purpose.

4.—The Committee shall have power to refuse membership to any applicant for admission or to ask any member to resign (after investigation by the Committee and confirmation by a general meeting), whose conduct they consider such as to militate against the welfare of the Association.

5.—Each Section shall be self-governing and self-supporting. The Committee, however, shall have power to grant financial aid to any section.

Each Section shall submit its programme to the General Committee for approval.

6.—The Annual Subscription shall be one shilling for the first two years after leaving School—after that it shall be two shillings—payable to any member of the Committee, before January 1st. In lieu of an Annual Subscription, a Life Subscription of twenty-five shillings may be made.

7.—These Rules shall be altered only at the Annual General Meeting, and then only by a two-thirds majority; all motions of such alteration to be in the hands of the Secretaries four days before the date of such meeting.

8.—The Annual General Meeting shall be held in September or October.
