#### PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

In 1995 another milestone will be reached in the history of the Grangefield schools. It was 80 years ago, in 1915, that the Stockton Secondary School, then in Nelson Terrace, was divided into two separate schools, for girls and boys and 'The Stocktonian' of that year proclaimed it was to be the official magazine of the two schools. Not until 1973 was coeducation restored, albeit in a very different form from that of the earlier time. The achievements of the two separate schools are still evidenced by the work of former pupils both in Stockton and further afield, "sandwiched" between the achievements of the combined schools and college on either side of 1915-1973.

On June 15th 1994 the beautiful crafted notice board, given as the Old Stocktonians' Association Memorial to our former President, Tom Sowler, was presented to Stockton Sixth Form College by Mrs Sowler. More details on this occasion will be found later in the book.

About 200 years ago Edmund Burke wrote, in his 'Reflections on the French Revolution', that "People will not look forward to posterity who never look backward to their ancestors". Perhaps this is another way of expressing Sir Walter Raleigh's dictum that "The councils to which Time is not called, Time will not ratify". In addition to the presentation of the notice board a fitting memorial to our former President might be to look back more often to our history as we plan for the future and so bind the generations together, bridging the so-called 'generation-gap'. If the Old Stocktonians' Association is to have any long-term future it is vital that younger members should come forward to support it and take a hand in its organisation. Perhaps 'The Old Stocktonians' Association' should also have its 'Revolution'.

#### COLLEGE ACTIVITIES 1994

#### Art :

In March an exhibition of paintings, drawings prints and textiles from the 1993 A-level Art exam was held at Blakeston and The Norton School. The GNVQ students visited the Gulbenkian Museum in Durham and various galleries in London.

In July a 3-day Art Summer School took place at Barnard Castle and visits were made to Cleveland College of Art & Design end of year exhibition and Teesside Design Department Degree show.

In September visits were made to the national Museum of Film, Photography & Television, Bradford and to an exhibition of recent works by David Hockney.

Biology

In July the department took part in the North East Industries/Schools Project week at the University of Durham.

In September a field trip to Hartlepool headland was arranged.

#### Charities :

On 9 March, 1994 the College held a Charities afternoon, with the proceeds going to the Joanne Gillespie Memorial Fund.

In April GNVQ Business studies students presented a cheque to the PDSA, Middlesbrough from funds raised through their Young Enterprise venture.

In September GNVQ Leisure & Tourism helped with a Fashion Show in aid of Oxfam.

#### Careers :

In the Summer Term visits were arranged to the Universities of Northumbria, York, Leicester, Leeds (Metropolitan), Oxford and Cambridge.

In the Autumn Term careers talks, work experience events and the Community Action programme involving 34 students working in local primary schools and 42 in local firms/hospitals/old people's homes were arranged.

#### Classics:

Visit to Classics Department's Open Day, Newcastle University.

#### Computing & IT :

A-level & BTEC National Diploma students visited ICI to undertake Case Studies and to McKinley Hyde Garages, Dickens DIY, Stockton District and Cleveland County Councils to view computer systems.

In May Year 9 students visited the College to take part in a 'Girls into IT' day.

In June a computing event was held jointly with Neighbourhood Engineers and the Physics department for Year 10 pupils.

In the same month BTEC IT Applications students began two weeks work experience.

#### Economics & Business Studies :

In January BTEC National Diploma students undertook work experience placements from which three students received offers of part-time employment. Students also attended a lecture by J K Galbraith and visited the Octagon Centre, Sheffield.

In March staff and students attended an A-level Economics conference at Sheffield University and an A-level Business studies conference at the Free Trade Hall, Manchester.

In September visits to the CAD/CAM Centre, Middlesbrough and Sedgefield Magistrates' Court were arranged.

A visit to ENRON computer control room at Hartlepool Power Station was arranged in November.

#### English :

Theatre visits were arranged to see 'A Midsummer Nights Dream' (3 separate performances - including

Stratford) and a trip to see 'Measure for Measure'. In March students attended a lecture on 'Wuthering Heights' at Newcastle University and a trip to see 'Macbeth' at Stratford was also arranged.

Geography:

GCSE Field work was undertaken in Yarm and A-level residential fieldwork in the Lake District. Three second year Geographers were amongst the three possible prizewinners in the 'Teesside Tomorrow' competition.

Geology :

Field trips were arranged through the year to Ingleton, Teesdale, Shap Fell, Appleby, Lake District, Vale of Eden, and the Durham/Northumberland coast.

#### Mathematics :

During the Autumn Term students attended a lecture on Relativity at Durham University, the Helen Sharman lecture on 'Space Flight' and Nottingham University's Astronomy Course.

Modern' Languages :

Exchange visits took place between the College and Asnières (Paris), Strasbourg (including work shadowing) and Barcelona.

On their visit to Strasbourg students 'shadowing' placements included : an interpreter at the Council of Europe; staff in a Lycée International, in Heineken, Citroen; 2 barristers; 1 judge; and staff in Nedia (an advertising firm). Two days of visits included an open-air museum, the Albert Schweitzer Museum, a guided visit of the Council of Europe and European Parliament, a boat trip on the Ile, a visit to a cathedral and a bus trip to Kehe, Germany - across the Rhine.

The students also found time to organise intensive language days in Spanish and German for Year 10 pupils and be involved with a weekly electronic mail link with a school in Germany.

#### Physics :

A busy year for the department included: students assisting with a 'problem solving day' in Primary Science at Oxbridge Lane School in January; a Neighbourhood Engineers Awareness Course; Industrial visits to Tioxide, ICI Wilton Centre and Cassel Works, Phillips Petroleum, British Steel and Black & Decker; two teams of students undertaking Industrial Research in Schools Projects over a 12-month period; Year 9 & 10 pupils from four partner schools took part in problem solving in Computing and Engineering; two students took part in NE Industry Project Week at Durham University; work experience students gave presentations to Davy McKee staff.

#### Psychology:

46 students attended a series of lectures in Manchester relevant to their A-level studies.

#### Social Studies :

In March 58 Sociology/Politics students visited London. The trip included visits to Parliament (to meet local MPs), to Party Central Offices, Bow Street Magistrates Court, The Old Bailey and Harrow & Westminster School.

Students in College took part in a live broadcast (from the College) discussing problems faced by young people and a one day workshop arranged by TocH and NACRO (National Association for the Care and Resettlement of Offenders) was attended by Sociology students.

#### Sports Studies & Games :

#### Soccer

1993/94 - The 'A'Team played 13, won 5, drew 1, lost 7 and reached the County Cup semi-final. Lee Wayne was a member of the Cleveland County U19 Squad. The 'B' Team played 8 won 4 and lost 4. The 'C' Team played 8 won 5, drew 2 and lost 1. The 'D' Team were not in a league but they won the Division 'C' knockout cup (for 'C' teams and below), beating Darlington Queen Elizabeth SFC 'C' Team in the final.

1994/95 - The 'A' Team has made an excellent start to the league winning all three matches to date (5-0, 2-0, 6-1) Three players (Neil Bromfield, Matt Adams and Matthew Mitchell) have been selected for the County Squad. The 'B', 'C' and 'D' teams are all unbeaten so far.

Hockey

1993/94 - The boys team finished 2nd in the BASICS finals held in March in Nottingham, the girls team finished 4th in their equivalent competition. David Cooper was selected for the U-18 North East of England Team, Gemma Adams and Clare Wilster were selected to play for the North of England U-18; in addition Gemma was selected for the England Schools U-18.

1994/95 - The boys have started the season well and show promise. The girls, in stark contrast to last year's team, have found it difficult to raise a team this year!

Rugby

1993/94 - The team had a good season with wins over Royal Grammar School (20-13), St Aidan's School (Sunderland) (29-3), and Hartlepool SFC (50-0) and a hard earned draw with Barnard Castle School. A number of players represented Durham and Cleveland Counties and Mark Adams had a full England Colleges trial.

1994/95 - With a young squad the team has found it hard going this season but has remained enthusiastic and keen to improve.

Athletics

1993/94 - Allison Curbishley was included in the Scotland Squad for (Hurdles) training for the Commonwealth Games. Andrew Kilding qualified for the FE BASICS Cross-Country Finals in Nottingham

#### Outdoor Pursuits :

Activities included involvement in the Duke of Edinburgh Award Scheme, Hedge-laying at castle Eden Walkway, and a week at Coniston with the Green Howards' army Youth Team.

#### **ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING 1993**

This was held on Wednesday, 9th February 1994 in the Staffroom of Stockton Sixth Form College with Miss L. Waring, the Association President, in the Chair. Others present were: Miss J. Farnaby, Mrs. P.A. Oxley, Messrs. B.P. Brand, P. Graham, J. Ingham, R. Prichard, K Turner, B. Bate and R. Ward; with apologies from Revd. J.M. Thomas, Messrs. H.R. Clarke and R Wynzar.

The Minutes of the previous AGM were not available. It was agreed that they be signed at the next Committee Meeting.

#### **Matters Arising**

Tom Sowler Memorial Fund - It was decided that this would be considered during the Treasurer's Report.

#### Membership Secretary's Report

The Secretary reported that, at present, there were 203 Life Members and 104 members paying by yearly instalments, of which 52 had paid in advance. 29 members still owed subscriptions. Mr R. Ward said that he had received notice of the deaths of five Members as follows: J.S. Gill; G. Broadbent; A.E. Bishop; W.L. Wilson; & W.N.Little. The number of members living abroad stood at 15, down from a high of over 50.

#### The Association Year Book

Miss Waring complimented everyone concerned in its production. Mr Graham said that 380 were printed. The bill for printing etc... was approximately £110 with postage costs of £61.94 for 288 books. He also thanked Mr B.P. Brand for securing full page adverts on the back and centre pages. Income from the advertisements covered the cost of printing.

#### Treasurer's Report

Mr B.P. Brand thanked Mr P. Fleck for his help in setting out his report. The accounts were in a healthy state with a £500 donation from Mrs Williams in memory of her late husband. The Tom Sowler Fund now stood at £433.33. The Evan Baldwin Fund stood at £61 plus interest, the King/Armstrong Fund stood at £156 plus interest and the Life Members and General Fund was in a healthy state. Mr B.P. Brand passed around the Darlington Building Society Account Book for inspection. As regards the Benevolent Fund Mr B.P. Brand said that £110 had been repaid and that no loans or grants had been made during the current year.

#### **Election of Officers**

Miss L. Waring was elected President. The current Vice-Presidents were proposed, seconded and re-elected. Office Bearers were also all re-elected and Miss J. Farnaby was elected as Assistant Dinner Secretary, Mr K. Turner and Mr B. Bate were also elected onto the Committee. Mr P. Fleck had agreed to continue As Honorary Auditor.

#### Any Other Business

A letter from Mr David Bowe M.E.P. was read out.

Mrs Williams had sent in the Dux Medal belonging to her late husband which was awarded by The Stockton Secondary School. Mr B.P. Brand suggested having it mounted and sent to Grangefield School.

Mr B.P. Brand circulated leaflets from Grangefield School referring to the Remembrance Day Service and School Prize giving.

#### 68th ANNUAL DINNER

The 68th dinner was held at the St. George Hotel, Teesside Airport on Saturday 19th March, 1994.

Our guests were David Bowe, European Member of Parliament for Cleveland and Yorkshire North, together with his wife Helena.

David gave us an insight into the workings of the European Parliament with some of

the benefits and pitfalls as he saw them. The balance was towards the socialists but, as he pointed out, the Parliament has members from the whole spectrum of public opinion from staunch Communism (dare we say revolutionary!) to vervant Nationalism. The middle ground in the Parliament covers the extremes within our own Parliament.

Contrary to what most people imagine, the M.E.P.'s only spend about one week a month in Strasbourg compared with three weeks in Brussels where the bulk of the work, mainly in committees, is conducted. David's average month, therefore is spent between his constituency, Strasbourg and Brussels with a lot of travelling thrown in. David's main interests concern Consumer Affairs, Health and Green issues. He is (was?) a full member of the Committee on Environment, Public Health and Consumer Protection. Debate can become quite heated and at times amusing when literal translations don't quite mean what is intended. He gave an example when a French colleague Jean-Pierre Cot, from Normandy - a region which prides itself on its common sense approach to life, was speaking on a serious matter. The simultaneous translation for his remark that some of his region's down-to-earth intelligence was needed as "What this problem needs is Norman wisdom". The tension was broken by the uproar and spluttering of the British delegation who had memories of the comic actor Norman Wisdom. David suggested that younger members of our Association should imagine the parallel scenario of Baldrick, from Black Adder, being called up to save Europe!

Some of us have experienced breakdown in language communications and David gave an example. One of his colleagues made what he thought was a simple order, in a Brussels restaurant. The order arrived with a beautifully cooked rabbit which he said he had not ordered. The mystery was solved when he found that he had ordered "la pain" [lapin !] instead of "du pain".

David concluded by proposing the toast to the Association. Afterwards David and Helena circulated to talk informally with our members and their guests, which included our old [he's 90 I] friend George Little.

Our "Principal" President, Howard Clarke was expected but couldn't manage to shake off the police! An hour before he was due to set off he was called to the College by the police as an intruder had been reported on the roof. The caretaker could not be contacted and Howard was asked to go to the College. As part of the College was being repaired and had scaffolding erected, Howard assumed that the report was correct. After opening most of the College and finding no disturbance he suggested that perhaps the report was wrong. The police refuted this as it had been reported by one of their own officers. Eventually they checked the report and found that the officer had misread the college board at the entrance - the intruder had been at the Stockton & Billingham College on the next site!! Louisa Waring gallantly held the "fort" while various messages were relayed by the Hotel to Brian Brand and then to our President. A good job Howard's first message was to start without him!



#### TREASURER'S REPORT - 1993/94

The Funds remain healthy and have been audited for the year ending 30th June 1994. The Life Members and General Fund has increased by about  $\mathfrak{L}200$ , the Evan Baldwin Fund has increased by around  $\mathfrak{L}20$  and the King / Armstrong Fund has decreased by around  $\mathfrak{L}10$ .

The Evan Baldwin Fund will last another three years at the current level of prizes. Only two prizes, instead of three, were awarded in 93-94 as there was no nominee for

The King/ Armstrong Fund will last another 10 years at the current value of prizes. Both extrapolations assume that there will be no donations, which is unlikely. The Dinner was self supporting last year as was the Year Book. Postage of £61.94 was the only call on the Life members and General Fund. Advertising to the tune of £118 financed the production of the Year Book, at £115.

We made a modest income of £11.18 from ties, stick-pins and History of the Association. Building Society interest of £68.15, subscriptions of £102.50 and

Donations of £190.48 formed the major part of our income.

A donation of £50 was made to the Joanne Gillespie Fund and £500 received from the widow of R.E.B. Williams was used, at her request, to found a new section of the College Library.

The Tom Sowler Memorial Fund was closed and the £532.67 collected was used to provide a sports' notice board at the College. More details of the last three items appear elsewhere in the Year Book.

Finally may I thank Peter Fleck, our Honorary Auditor, for his advice and patience during the preparation of the accounts.



#### THE TOM SOWLER MEMORIAL

Over the two years of our appeal your donations and Building Society interest amounted to over £470. A donation from the College made the total £532.67, which was the total cost of the Memorial.

As reported last year, we commissioned an 8 feet by 4 feet notice board from Ken Wilkinson of Kilvington Studios, near Thirsk. The board, featuring a carved oak tree at the top, is for sports' notices and team lists; it is already being well used!

The 'hand over' by Tom's widow, Agnes, took place on Wednesday 15 June and was attended by Tom's family, a group of his friends representing his many interests, representatives of the O.S.A., the Corporation and Staff of the College and of Grangefield School.

Agnes, her son Peter and daughter Marnie kindly provided sherry for those present.

The plate on the lower bar of the Notice Board reads :

IN MEMORY OF LOCAL HISTORIAN TOM SOWLER 1914 - 91
PRESIDENT OF THE O.S.A. 1959 - 62 & 1988 - 91
CHAIRMAN OF COLLEGE GOVERNORS 1980 - 86
PRESENTED BY THE OLD STOCKTONIANS JUNE 1994

In a letter to us Peter Sowler thanked the former Pupils and College and summed up what we had achieved. To quote part of his letter :

"When I first learned of the Fund, I had no idea what would be done with the money but I hoped it would be spent on something which would last a long time and would not get lost or be stuck in a dark corner. I was delighted to see that the notice board was made by a true craftsman and will last much longer than any other notice board in the College. It is not stuck in a corner and sports' notice boards tend to be well read by students. It is certainly too large to lose! I am absolutely certain that Tom would have been delighted with the end result."

When you are in Stockton, pop into the College and have a look at the board, but please introduce yourself to the main office first!



#### THE JOANNE GIILLESPIE APPEAL

Joanne Gillespie was a pupil at Grangefield School who fought bravely against cancer until her untimely death at the age of fifteen.

She wrote two books to encourage other sufferers and to point out that life, however short is worth living. Those who met her came away feeling rather humble. Her two books are "Brave Hearts" and "Well, I'm Still Here".

Grangefield School have dedicated part of its library to Joanne's memory. This section was officially opened on 29 June by Joanne's parents Kathleen and Peter together with Sarah, Joanne's sister. The Association gave a donation of £50 towards the section.

Kath and Peter have started a fund to raise £120,000 to buy a laser for use in a local hospital. The special Fibre Optics Laser can be used to treat deep seated tumours which are difficult to reach. It will, in most cases reduce the surgery required, especially for brain tumours. The fund is now nearly halfway to its target (nearly £60,000) and any member who would like to send a donation can make out the cheque to "The Joanne Gillespie Memorial Fund" and send it to : Mr & Mrs P. #### THE R.E.B. WILLIAMS GIFT

R.E.B. ("Scorcher") Williams attended the Nelson Terrace building from 1908 to 1915. He was Head Boy [Dux Medalist] in 1914. He died in June 1990 aged 92 and last year his widow, Dorothy, contacted us to ask if we would help by suggesting a suitable memorial to her husband. She also asked us to accept his Dux medal and, if possible, find a suitable "home" for it.

The College suggested a contribution to the library. A new section on Law was proposed to support a new department teaching that subject. As Robert had been called to the Bar of the Middle Temple in 1936, this seemed wholly appropriate.

Dorothy made a gift of £500 to buy books which will have plates dedicating them to the memory of Robert. A plaque, suitably inscribed, will be fixed to the wall in the library.

The Dux medal, which is 9 carat gold, was accepted by Grangefield School and will be on display there.

Our thanks are extended to Dorothy for her generous gifts.

#### FORMER STUDENTS HERE AND THERE

It was nice to hear from **D.E. BAILEY** (1928 - 33) again after a gap of many years. We were pleased to receive a donation to funds and confirmation of his address but sadly no other news to add.

Surprised to see his name in the 93/4 Year Book GORDON BELSHAW (1949 - 56) contacted us with an address confirmation and a generous donation to subs and Tom Sowler's Fund. Although he can only recall some of the incidents mentioned by Mike Watson in his missive, the struggle through A level Maths is a vivid memory. Having qualified as a chartered accountant in 1962 Gordon spent 21 years trying to help budding accountants achieve the same at Constantine College/Teesside Polytechnic (now Teesside University). Throughout the same period he was also in practice for himself and after leaving the Poly. settled down to "life as a sole practitioner". It was instant "report" for being off the school site at break. Incidentally Watsons ran a competition/promotion which required you to collect letters [one in every packet] and spell out "watsons". Brian noticed recently that similar promotions have been given much publicity - for missing out a vital letter !! Who remembers which letter was missing from Watsons? Brian was delighted to renew contact with Dave Rayner and Peter Wishlade at the Dinner. He felt that they were still the same "characters" he remembered from 30 years ago and by the end of the evening could almost believe that he had been transported back in time. It was pleasing to know that their basic good qualities had not been lost. He would still like to contact the other members of that first class of his. No-one seems to have heard of GARTH HOLLIGAN, HENRY HUDSON, DAVID JONES or PETER DUNCAN for many years [Unless YOU know better ---- Editor]

Apologies to CATHERINE BUTLER (1990 - 92) for our entry last year. The Sponsorship from J. Sainsbury is separate from the Opportunity 2000 Award. Catherine was one of the first nine ever to be chosen for the Award, which Sainsbury's have decided to give, in conjunction with the Government.

A new address (Redditch, Worcs.) as promised from TONY CAINS (1986 - 88) but no other news of himself or contemporaries.

NORMAN CARR (1939 - 44) has responded to our comment in last year's magazine that he was trying to arrange 'a meet' with MIKE SIZER (1939 - 44) Having obtained Mike's address Norman wrote to him about his possible visit to the U.K. but received no reply. Norman was concerned that the mention of his meet with BILL CHARNLEY (1939 - 44) had also prompted no response from Mike and was beginning to wonder about 'his well-being'. A speedy reply from **STEWART FOX** (1958 - 63), via Brian Brand, enabled us to keep in touch after his magazine had been returned. We understand that Stewart is a butcher with premises in Spencer Hall, Stockton High Street.

A most generous donation accompanied an address confirmation and subs 'top-up' from R. SAXON FRENCH (1940 - 45). He is enjoying his retirement in West Newton, Sandringham. Proving that no matter where you are Stocktonians abound, CYRIL ('CID') DAVIDSON (1941 - 46) lives in the same village and retired in March 1994.

When his magazine was returned 'Gone Away' in 1993 we thought that we had lost touch with J.W.L. GALE (1928 - 35). However the grapevine/post must still be working for he contacted us in February 1994 with his new address in Upper Beeding, West Sussex. He retired in 1976 from service with the British Council after working in Iran, Malaya, British Guyana, Republic Of the Congo (Zaire), Colombia, South America, Sudan and, finally, Brazil. Having been awarded the C.B.E. in 1975 and retiring in the following year he returned to England to live in Saffron Walden, Lincoln and West Sussex (where he suspects his world travels will end). With hardly any relatives now living in Stockton his visits 'home' are not frequent but he may be 'in town' in 1994. [If not 1994 then perhaps the 1995 Dinner? - Editor]

An address confirmation and subs top-up from MARTIN GILLESPIE (1979 - 81) but no other news.

Notification of a change of address (from Leicester to Leamington Spa) and a nice donation from JAN GILLETT (1957 - 64). After graduating from Manchester University in 1968 with a Geology Degree Jan joined Pilkington Fibre Glass Ltd. as a sales rep dealing in insulation material. As a newly qualified geologist a 'job on the rigs' or in some far flung corner of the globe might have been expected but Jan was planning to get married and a local job with Pilkingtons fitted best with those plans. Jan admits that "right from the start I was a rebel", not in an anti-establishment way but in the way firms treated their customers. This meant challenging the "way things had always been done" and inevitably "the boss". This approach must have been tolerated by his managers because not only did he stay with the company but moved into product and marketing development in the insulation division (which boomed with energy conservation ideals of the early 70s) and in 1981 was promoted to customer services manager and also chairman of the Thermal Insulation Manufacturers and Suppliers Association. In 1983, 'out of the blue', Jan was offered the Managing Directorship of Kitsons Insulation Products, a subsidiary of Pilkingtons based in Barking. Three years of hard work turned the company round from a loss maker to one producing a profit of £1.5 m. Despite the success he was still not satisfied that he was able to work in the way he believed was best and so, approaching 40, he spent £2,000 for an outplacing agency to find him another senior position. This led him to becoming Managing Director, in 1986 of Sketchley Textile Services, based in Hinkley, Leicestershire. Amongst his customers were Ford (UK) and it was at a management seminar organised by them that he heard of the work of Dr. W. E. Deming. Deming introduced his statistical business methodology to industrialists in Japan in the 1950s, when his ideas had been shunned by the USA, and they are credited with establishing systems that enabled managers and employees to work in harmony and their goods to sweep world markets. Jan had discovered the man who was to become his guru. Jan was immediately convinced that the 14 principles of management advocated by Deming made all the thoughts he had about total quality 'drop into place'. He set about introducing the principles into his own company and a transformation in customer service, stock control and employee satisfaction took place. Unfortunately in 1990 boardroom changes cut Jan's tenure at Sketchley short and he left to set up his own consultancy in Leicester before joining Process Management International, an arm of a Deming based consultancy, established in Minneapolis in 1984. A founder member of the British Deming Association, Jan is now dedicated to management principles that helped modern Japanese companies introduce 'total quality' and produce world class goods.

An address change (from Warwick to Whitby) and donation from IAN GRANT (1946 - 51) but no other details.

JACK HAIGH (1921 - 25) has written to clear up the details asked for on his nominations mentioned in last year's magazine. The American Biographical Institute has approximately 100 biographies in print and as such is one of the largest independent publishers of biographies in the world. Jack's personal biography seems to be of special interest to them and his name has been included in Edition 4 of the A.B.I.'s 'Five Thousand Personalities of the World'. Jack has had an illustrious career as a script writer before and during the War years in the Middle East and later in South Africa & BFBS. Thereafter he was on the staff of the Racing Calendar, The Daily Sketch, The Daily Mirror and the Daily Mail in addition to having several books published. His career continues with new possibilities in the pipeline.

#### **OBITUARIES**

We were saddened to hear of the death, on 11 March 1994, of WALTER AUTON (1949 - 54). Walter was one of the pupils who divided his time at school between Nelson Terrace and Grangefield and was therefore able to contrast the old and the new versions of education at the "old school". He joined the Army in 1956 and served for 37 years before retiring with the rank of Major in July 1993. Sadly this retirement was cut short and we offer our sincere condolences to his wife Jean, their son and two daughters.

A letter in early 1994 informed us of the death, on 13 December 1993, of one of our oldest members **ALBERT E BISHOP** (1915 - 19). Although he was not a regular contributor to the magazine 'Bert always had a great affection for the Association and read our publication with interest. We were informed of 'Bert's death by his niece Olive Bowlby and through her we send sympathy to all the family.

Early in 1994 we were informed of the death, on 22 December 1993, of GRAHAM BROADBENT (1943 - 49). We send our sympathy to his wife Jean and her family.

The Association was informed of the death in 1993 of J.S. GILL (1915 - 18). He joined the 'Sec in the 3rd form and having been inspired in the 5th form, by a lesson of engineering drawing given by a visitor from a local firm, Stanley unsuccessfully tried to get a job as a draughtsman at Blairs, Head Wrightson & Ropners. His first job was as an apprentice electrical fitter at the Malleable Steelworks, but a year or two after his apprenticeship had finished he joined the Post Office Engineering Dept. at Middlesbrough in 1924. Stan retired in 1966 after 41 years service, without ever having missed a day through illness. Married in 1925 to a talented pianist Stan had two sons both of whom inherited their mother's musical talents. Following his retirement Stan became something of a globetrotter, regularly visiting the 'States and the Mediterranean. Sadly Stan's wife passed away in 1985 as did his eldest son Stanley.

One of our oldest members W.N. LITTLE (1914 - 18) died on 28 September 1993.

We were recently informed that a longstanding local friend of the Association HARRY PIERCY (1945 - 49) died in September 1993. The sadness of his loss was increased by the fact that Harry had not long retired as Corporate Director of Barclays Bank for the Northern Region. Having joined Barclays Bank in 1950 he became a Manager in Darlington in 1967 after moving around the North East for some years. Harry was, subsequently, Manager at Barnard Castle and then 49 High Street, Stockton before going to Leeds as a Local Director in 1979. From 1988 he was Corporate Director of the Northern Region controlling the branches in the area from North Yorkshire to the Scottish border. We offer our sincere condolences to his wife Ruth and their family.

Although he only attended the Sec' for a short period R. W. (Bob) RUTHERFORD (1914 - 17) had a great affection for the Association and was one of our regular contributors both in financial and literary terms. It was therefore with great sadness that we learned that he had died on 12 September 1994 at the age of 91. His son David wrote that there was "No mourning at this end; only celebration for a splendid long life full of interest".

t was with particular sacriess that we learned in January 1994 of the death, on 29 August 1993 of WILLIAM LAWRENCE WILSON (1923 - 27). "WL" as he was known by his colleagues had a great affection for his old school and this Association and was a requier contributor to the pages of this magazine, particularly over the last five years. Having left school without progressing to the "sixth form" he trained in engineering design at ICI, Billingham, and through night classes eventually obtained his decree and became a member of the Institute of Mechanical Engineers. Although he see only 25 at the outbreak of WWII he played a significant role during that war in the and Royal Ordnance Factories. His first project just before the outbreak of The was a TNT factory at Irvine at a time when no other was operating. TNT is a some and highly-volatile explosive and WL described his association with it as " a vovace of discovery into responsibility". In addition to his work on Ordnance factories he was seen involved in the design of the Fighting Vehicle Proving Establishment at Chersey in Surrey. WL emerged from the war as a superintending engineer at the old Ministry of Works which, at 33, rated in terms of civil service seniority as something of a record. His strength lay not just in his technical ability but also in his capacity to inspire others. After the war WL found himself transferred to the newly-created atomic energy projects in which Britain was then at the cutting edge of development. With five collegues he was sent to Chalk River in Canada where his host and mentor was Sir John Cockcroft. He described the next 10 years as "exciting, lengthy days demanding seem decisions with long and short views, with no time for learned dissertation, wise or person of scussions or steering committees and working parties". Back in Britain his first project was to create the atomic research establishment at Harwell, followed by Ticse at Aldermaston, Sellafield and Capenhurst. The project he enjoyed most was that at Aldermaston where he was faced with designing and building a radioactive materials production line within 18 months, a feat which he achieved in March 1952. In 1954 he was promoted to assistant chief engineer and set to work on the rocket test establishment at Spadeadam for the test launchings of Blue Streak (Britain's intermediate range ballistic missile) Having completed the build in three years Britain's lead was lost by the inability of successive governments to see the advantage of the rocket for military and future commercial activities and it was left to France to lead Europe while our technological expertise and leadership was frittered away. In 1962 WL was promoted to be chief engineer at the Ministry of Public Works and Buildings and went on to become deputy secretary there in 1967, later moving, on the merger of the ministry, to the Department. This post was the highest rank within the civil service that any engineer had attained until that time. During his later years at the DoE he took a keen interest in training young engineers, always looking for those who had strong staying power. He built up the Residential Training School at RAF Cardington from an intake of 250 a year to 1,500 a year. Just before he retired in 1972 he was involved in the reorganisation of various Ministries into the Property Services Agency. He wrote that he found himself becoming "an expert on reorganisation" - an expertise, many of his colleagues sensed. that he would rather not have achieved. Some public recognition of his work was reflected in his appointment as OBE in 1954 and CB in 1967. He enjoyed a long, busy and active retirement in which he continued to concern himself with setting standards of excellence for engineers throughout the country. In their sad loss we extend our deepest sympathy to his widow, Constance, and their two sons.
