

## A DESERTER SINCE JANUARY

A man named Charles E Peacock (31) soldier, of 161 Smith Street, Stockton, was charged at Middlesbrough with being drunk and a deserter from the army since January. It was stated that his wife died on Tuesday. Detective Supt Stones said he telephoned to the commanding officer suggesting that the man might not be sent back until after the funeral, but as yet had no reply. For being drunk he was fined 7s 6d, or seven days. No action was taken to the desertion. Later at the request of Detective Supt Stones, the defendant was allowed out on bail.

## Poison Gas Used On Soldiers

On April 22<sup>nd</sup> 1915, during the 2<sup>nd</sup> Battle of Ypres, poison chlorine gas was used by the German troops for the first time. Losses during the battle are estimated at 59,000 British troops.

An extract from 5<sup>th</sup> Btn Durham Light Infantry by A.L Raimes says: For several days there had been fierce fighting for possession of Hill 60, but otherwise the line had been quiet for many weeks. On April 20<sup>th</sup> the Germans began a furious bombardment of Ypres. Many soldiers and civilians were killed, and within a short time Ypres had become a deserted town, except for the few unfortunate troops who had to remain. On Thursday 22<sup>nd</sup>, about 5pm, the enemy commenced a heavy bombardment of the French section of the salient, and at the same time a strange greenish cloud of vapour gradually rose from the German lines, and propelled by the wind, moved across to where troops holding the French line were waiting in their trenches wondering what this curious cloud portended. They were soon choking and gasping in the gas. Taken by surprise, and without any means of defence, it is not surprising that most of them gave way.







On Thursday he went to the firing line, where in the first few days of actual fighting he was knocked out.
