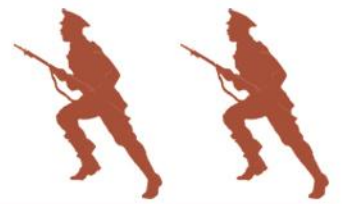

“DIED DOING HIS DUTY”

STORY OF HOW STANLEY DOWNEY WAS KILLED

Mr T Downey – Town clerk of Stockton and Mrs Downey, have not yet received any official confirmation of the death of their only son Stanley, at the front but it would seem that the sad news is only too true.

It is contained in the following letter from Lance Corporal G Shaw of the Royal Engineers in France dated 8th August 1915.

“It is with deepest regret that I write to you, but as a friend of your son Stanley I consider it my duty to do so. We were out on Sunday night doing some very dangerous work at the trenches and while your son was looking to one of our wounded men, he was hit by a piece of shell and passed away by the side of one of the other poor fellows. We all admired him for his gentlemanly behaviour and for the way he did his duty, while helping a wounded comrade. I am expecting a cross over his grave as a token of the respect all the boys had for him.

Corporal Downey, from other accounts received, in addition to the above was a favourite in his regiment. He was a youth with an excellent education and was expecting early promotion. For several months he had acted as an Assistant Quartermaster.

NEW NAVAL MEDAL

To be awarded for service in minor operations

The following is an extract from today's London Gazette. The King has been pleased to sanction the establishment of a medal to be known as the Naval General Service medal, to be awarded for service in minor naval war like operations, whether in the nature of belligerency or polices which may be considered of sufficient importance to justify the award of a medal in cases where no other medal would be appropriate. The medal will have a distinctive ribbon - white with crimson borders and two crimson stripes and a clasp with appropriate wording.
