WOMEN'S RIGHT TO SERVE

DEMONSTRATION IN LONDON



On the 17th of July thousands of women from all classes gathered in central London in a mass demonstration in the name of a woman's 'right to serve'. Women were united in their patriotism and sense of duty.

The demonstration was organised by the Women's Social & Political Party and Emily Pankhurst and was sanctioned and paid for by the Ministry of Munitions, headed by Lloyd George.

Emily Pankhurst had agreed to mobilise a female work force on the understanding that they would replace male workers in factories and on the land, for which they would receive equal pay for equal work.

EXECUTION OF TWO GERMAN SPIES AT THE TOWER OF LONDON

At 6:00am on the 30th of July 1915 William Roos aged 33 was executed by a firing squad of Scots Guards and ten minutes later at 6:10am Haicke Janssen was executed by firing squad.

Each man had been tried and found guilty of spying.

Both men had been masquerading as cigar salesmen. They came under suspicion by the British Security Services when they intercepted telegrams sent to Germany by Janssen and Roos. In the telegrams Janssen was ordering Havana cigars. The BSS had discovered a code was being used within telegrams the to send information about the warships that were in Southampton. Roos had also sent telegrams in code and he made a small but significant error when he said that there was a big demand for cigars in naval ports. He failed to realise that seamen usually smoked pipes or cigarettes not cigars.

STOCKTON SOLDIER KILLED Story of a gallant deed at Antwerp

July 1915

News has just been received that Private Harry A Reay RMLI RN Division, the 2nd son of Mr John Reay Borough Accountant at Stockton has been killed near the Dardanelles during the present campaign. Private Reay has conducted himself with conspicuous bravery.

One incident in particular in which he played a leading part is worth recalling. He was a member of the Royal Marine Brigade which was defending Antwerp, and when retreat was absolutely necessary Private Jenkins, who was in the same trench as Private Reay, implored his comrades to leave him and escape whilst they had a chance. "My Legs gone." he said in an agonised voice. "I cannot move, never mind, though, lads, save yourselves while you can." Bullets and shells were bombarding the trench at that time and Reay was heedless of this.

"What!" he exclaimed "Leave you to the murderous villains?" "Not Likely!" He then lifted the unfortunate Jenkins over his shoulder and under a fusillade of bullets he managed to reach the British lines unscathed. Sometime late Private Jenkins wrote to him from the Naval Hospital Chatham stating he was recovering after three operations.

AN APPEAL

The following letter although not signed, seems to be genuine.

"I and other Tommies in Khaki are vexed at the state of affairs in the borough. I have just finished a short leave at home after 10 months at the front, and I was surprised to see the thousands of civilians walking the streets of the borough, half of them wearing the war badge and not enlisted to it, not being on war work at all. This badge covers a lot of cowardice in my opinion. I heard of a borough man enlisting the other day who got his two sons in the army, at fifty years old. Is that not a disgrace to some young men at home? My parents have given their all to the cause, four eldest sons who were able to earn a penny for the old folks; yet they are proud of what they have done and so are we. Why don't other people make some sacrifice? We shall not get them if the women and girls keep encouraging them the way they were while I was at home."
