SERGT. COOPER V.C.

The public presentation to Sergt. Cooper V.C., of Stockton, is to be made on Sunday at the Hippodrome Theatre. which has been generously loaned, free charge, by the manager, Mr George Stainton. It will consist illuminated an address setting forth the town's appreciation of the brave deed which won the Sergeant the high distinction of the Victoria Cross. & also War bonds to the value £150. The proceedings will be open to the general public and a silver collection will be made by the lady members of the Combined Cyclists Committee, who have promoted the funds, and the proceeds devoted to a local war heroes fund. A SOLDIERS WIFE'S STORY

Assuming that her husband, who was a soldier in France, was dead, (because a letter was returned through the "dead letter" office marked "missing"), Irene Hill married an Australian soldier. At Highgate she was committed for trial on a charge of bigamy, and the soldier Clement was Showter, also committed for aiding and abetting her. When arrested Showter said he had been wounded and after leaving hospital, he was introduced to Mrs Hill. with whom he fell in and married intending to take her back to Australia with him after the war. The woman said that she had 2 children by her lawful husband with whom said she led 'a cat and dog' life. In consequences of his cruelty she was once led to take poison, and since then he had several times threatened to murder her. He had written to the from front saying that he would not stand in her way if she met another man

whom she could really love and marry.

The story of a boy's escapade was told in the Juvenile Court today, when John William Clenaghan (13), of 26 Farrer Street was charged with stealing £13 and a bicycle, value £5, from Mrs Colley, with whom he resides. The Chief Constable said the boy rode to Stockton, and then took a train to London. and thence to Folkestone. His object was to join his father in France. Mrs Colley said she did not wish to press the charge.

The Stipendiary ordered the boy 4 strokes, and warned him seriously.

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

STOCKTON GUARDIANS

Αt а meeting of Stockton Board of Guardians yesterday, chairman stated that they had received a letter from the food controller advising Guardians to use pickled herrings in the menu at the Workhouse cottage homes. These were considered as of high food value, and a good substitute for meat. The mayor did not regard the price as Mr W cheap. Lawrenson said he noticed that other Board of Guardians had refused to have anything to do with pickled herrings, but he saw no reason why they should not be tried.





THE DIFFICULT BOY AND GIRL

Huntley, extension Mrs lecturer of the Sunday School Union. visited Stockton conducting conference on Sunday problems. school after addressing а largely attended public meeting. The Rev C. W. Screech presided at the former and the Rev G.C Leader (president of the local union) at the latter. At the meeting evenina Miss Huntley spoke of the increase of iuvenile delinquency during the war. 50,000 boys and girls. she said were brought before the magistrates per year, as against 30,000 before the war. Many of the offences were not so much to criminal instinct as to desire for adventure, love of risk and lovalty to a leader. This constituted a challenge to the worker among the young of directing these emotions to higher ends. Miss Huntley paid tribute to the fine work of probation officers in police courts in such re-directive work and specially urged the need of Sunday school workers to appeal to that sense of the heroic, that longing for friendship, that craving for responsibility largely characterised the difficult boy and girl.

FALL OF JERUSALEM-DECEMBER 9TH 1917

After Turkish troops move out of the region after a single day's fighting, officials of the Holy City of Jerusalem offer the kevs the city the to to encroaching British troops. The British, led by General Edmund Allenby, entered the Holy City two days later under strict instructions from London on how not to appear disrespectful to the city, its people, or its traditions. In a proclamation declaring martial law,(that was read aloud to the city's people Arabic. in English, Russian Hebrew, and Greek), Allenby assured them that the occupying power would not inflict further harm on Jerusalem, its inhabitants. or its Holy places. "Since your city is regarded with affection by the adherents of 3 of the greater religions of mankind, and its soil has been consecrated by the prayers and pilgrimages of multitudes of devout people, I make it known to you that every sacred building, monument, holy spot. shrine. traditional site. endowment, pious bequest or customary place of prayer will be maintained according to the existing


customs and beliefs of those to whose faith they are sacred". Church bells in Rome and London rang to celebrate the peaceful British arrival Jerusalem. Allenby's success, after so much discouragement on the Western front. elated inspired allied and supporters everywhere. www.history of War




