

All gangways, passages and staircases shall be kept entirely free from chairs or any other obstruction, and no person shall be allowed to sit or stand during any performance or entertainment in such gangways, passages or staircases. The public shall be permitted to leave by all entrance doors after each performance or entertainment. No smoking shall be permitted to take place on the stage except as part of a performance or entertainment. The fireproof curtain to the proscenium opening must be lowered and raised at least once during every performance or entertainment to ensure that it is in proper working order.




