MAX BYGRAVES

Max Bygraves was born and bred a Londoner. He left school at the age of fourteen to train as a carpenter, and the same year won a talent contest at the New Cross Empire. At seventeen he enlisted in the R.A.F. and served during the war for $5\frac{1}{2}$ years, spending some time entertaining the troops.

He was demobbed in 1946 and returned to carpentry but on being granted an audition by the B.B.C. he was heard by an impresario and offered a part in a touring revue.

He began to tour theatres in Britain, was seen by his present Managers, Jock Jacobsen and Norman Payne, and signed over immediately. He spent the next two years touring the country with a single act.

He was appearing at a London suburban theatre when the star comedian at the London Palladium was unable to appear for one day, and Max Bygraves stepped into the breach. He was an immediate success. Val Parnell at once booked him for two weeks, and, after receiving terrific acclamation from the press, he was held over for another two weeks.

He then appeared at the Prince of Wales Theatre in the West End of London for three weeks, followed immediately by four weeks at the London Palladium with Judy Garland.

He has appeared in five Royal Command Performances, and has made an outstanding success in the radio series "Educating Archie," as well as having many other radio and television shows to his credit.

He appeared in America with Judy Garland—at the Palace Theatre, New York, and the Philharmonic Auditorium, Los Angeles—and in 1955 he made two very successful appearances on the Ed Sullivan Show in New York.

He starred in the film "Charley Moon," a film about a music hall comic, and has recently concluded a very successful run in his own show at the London Hippodrome, "Meet Me On The Corner."
