Among the men unloading Michele's barge at a Paris quayside is a young man, Luigi. He is in love with Michele's young wife. Giorgetta. Michele, much older than his wife, suspects that she has a lover without knowing who it is. He vainly tries to win back his wife's love, reminding her of the time when she and their baby used to nestle beneath his old cloak. Left alone, Michele strikes a match to light his pipe and unwittingly gives the pre-arranged signal between Giorgetta and her lover. Luigi comes on deck and Michele throws himself on him and strangles him, after forcing an admission of guilt out of him. He hides the body under his cloak. When Giorgetta appears, he opens the cloak and reveals her dead lover.

OEDIPUS REX

The Myth

Oedipus was the son of Jocasta and Laiu's, king of Thebes. In fear of an oracle, which had informed Laius that he would die by the hand of his son, Jocasta exposed Oedipus at birth and left him to die on Mount Cithaeron. The child, however, survived and was brought up by Polybus, king of Corinth, and his wife as their son. One day, angered at some taunt about his birth, Oedipus went to Delphi to consult the oracle and was told he was destined to kill his father and commit incest with his mother. In an attempt to escape from his destiny, he resolved never to return to Corinth to his supposed. father and mother. On his wanderings after leaving Delphi he encountered Laius and killed him in a quarrel without knowing who he was. Meanwhile, the Thebans had been terrorised by the Sphinx, a monstrous creature, who propounded riddles to men and killed them if they failed to answer. The throne of Thebes and the hand of the queen had been offered to the man who overcame the monster. Oedipus vanquished the Sphinx, ascended the throne and wedded Jocasta. Subsequently, as retribution for the incestuous marriage, Thebes was visited by a plague, which, according to the oracle, was destined to continue until the murderer of Laius was expelled from the city. Oedipus took a solemn oath to find the murderer. Bit by bit the dreadful truth became known. Jocasta hanged herself and Oedipus. self-blinded, was driven from Thebes.
