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
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NORMAN VAUGHAN

. . . was born in the 'twenties and comes from Liverpool. He has worked long and hard for his success. Making his stage debut at the age of 13, he has spent more than 25 years in show business - and looks ten years younger than his real age as a result. During his three marathon seasons as compere of A.T.V.'s SUNDAY NIGHT AT THE LONDON PALLA-DIUM (he took over on 7th January, 1962, and compared over 100 shows up to 1965), Norman not only gave the nation two new catch-phases in "swinging" and "dodgy", but his thumbs-up sign was used by the Labour Party in the 1964 election.

Since he left the Palladium Show in 1965, Norman has consolidated his career, including an appearance at a Royal

Variety Performance. He has worked in pantomime, had his own T.V. series on I.T.V. and B.B.C. presented his own stage show, and appeared in Cabaret in this country and abroad.

In 1967 he added a further dimension to his career by entering the realms of "straight" theatre. He made his straight acting debut in BOEING-BOEING; has appeared in other touring play presentations and now breaks into the Musical Comedy field in his own interpretation of Billy Early in NO, NO, NANETTE.

EILEEN GOURLAY

through Pantomimes, Revues and Musicals as a singer and comedienne and established herself in many London Cabaret night-spots including TALK OF THE TOWN. Eileen got her first major role playing Hedy in HOW TO SUCCEED IN BUSINESS WITHOUT REALLY TRYING. Then followed the title role of Belle Poitrine in the hit show LITTLE ME playing opposite Bruce Forsyth. A break in her career followed whilst she started a family — married to Musical Director, Ed. Coleman, they now have three-year twins. Eileen has previously appeared at The Forum Theatre in THE IMAGINARY INVALID and SQUARING THE CIRCLE.



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McDONALD HOBLEY is a "Kelper" that's the name given to those who are born in the Falkland Islands.

"Mac" made his first appearance professionally in 1935 in Brighton, in — guess what — NO, NO, NANETTE. There followed three years with the Theatre Royal Brighton Repertory Company. After a season at the Festival Theatre, Cambridge, and a long tour with TIME AND THE CONWAYS, war was declared. Seven years later Captain Hobley, R.A., returned to the theatre. In 1946 he became one of the B.B.C.'s announcers and during the last twenty years has done almost every job that you can think of on T.V.

He has appeared in many pantomimes, and perhaps his best radio show, which is still running after over ten years, is DOES THE TEAM THINK, with Jimmy Edwards, Ted Ray and Tommy Trinder.

LESLIE MEADOWS was born in Manchester and started his acting career with the Oldham Repertory Company. From there he went to the Manchester Library Theatre. His first West End engagement was in the musical PASSION FLOWER HOTEL, followed by THE MATCH GIRLS. Whilst auditioning as Tommy Steele's stand-in for the film HALF A SIXPENCE he was given a screen test, resulting in his getting the principal role of Buggins. After a year filming HALF A SIXPENCE, he was given a five year contract with Paramount Pictures. His next film was UP THE JUNCTION. On T.V. he has played in SANCTUARY (I.T.V.), DIDDLE RIDDLE and the Terry Scott Spectaculars.

LESLEY HAND was born in Wembley, London. She has appeared on T.V. as a dancer in many shows including THE ROLF HARRIS SHOW, THE ANDY STEWART SHOW and the ERIC ROBINSON SERIES.

Lionel Blair, who directs the musical, said, "I found Lesley after three weeks auditioning. As soon as she walked through the door, it clicked. Here was the 1969 Nanette."

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
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THE DIRECTOR, LIONEL BLAIR, SAYS:
