


DONALD ADAMS



His many roles included Tamino in The Magic Flute, Jenik in The Bartered Bride, Lenski in Eugene Onegin, and he scored a great personal success as Count Danilo in The Merry Widow both at Sadlers Wells and at the London Coliseum, where he appeared in the Royal Command Performance in 1958.

In 1962 and 1964 Festival of London productions of The Yeomen of the Guard at the Tower of London, he played the role of Colonel Fairfax, and had the honour of being presented to Her Majesty the Queen and the Duke of Edinburgh during a performance. He is well known in Gilbert and Sullivan operas as he was principal tenor with the D'Oyly Carte Opera Company for many years, touring extensively in Great Britain, the United States and Canada. He played the role of Baron von Schober in the successful tour of Lilac Time in South Africa in 1964, and in 1966 repeated this role in the tour of Lilac Time in England.


VALERIE MASTERSON


HELEN LANDIS



won the merit award at an International competition in Salzburg. Last year, he received a royal command to sing in a charity performance in Bucking-




MICHAEL MOORES
