

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PHYLLIS CALVERT

Phyllis Calvert went to the Margaret Morris School of Dancing and Acting and appeared with Ellen Terry at the Lyric Theatre, Hammersmith, in 1925 in Crossings by Walter de la Mare. She made her first professional London stage appearance in 1939 in A Woman's Privilege at the Kingsway Theatre; and she starred in several important British films during the war. She appeared in Terence Rattigan's Flare Path at the Lyric Theatre. Her other West End plays have included Escapade, It's Never Too Late, A River Breeze, Love From Margaret and The Complaisant Lover at the Globe Theatre in 1959. Since then she has appeared in The Rehearsal, originally at the Bristol Old Vic and subsequently at the Globe Theatre, where it ran for over a year; Menage a Trois at the Lyric Theatre; Portrait Of Murder at the Savoy and Vaudeville Theatres; The Scene Of Flowers at the Duke of York's and two Noel Coward revivals Present Laughter and Blithe Spirit. She recently appeared in Edward Albee's All Over at the Theatre Royal, York.

Her many notable films include Kipps, The Man In Grey, Fanny By Gaslight, Of Two Worlds, They Were Sisters, Madonna Of The Seven Moons, Men Mr. Denning Drives North, The Net, Mandy, Indiscreet, Oscar Wilde with Robert Morley, Twisted Nerve, and Oh, What A Lovely War! Miss Calvert has played Kate in the enormously successful television series of that name.


OWEN HOLDER

Owen Holder made his debut in London's West End in 1945 in The Simpleton Of The Unexpected Isles at the Arts Theatre and since then has appeared in many of London's principal theatres in a variety of plays, including The Amiable Mrs. Luke, Now Barabbas . . . , Black Chiffon (his son was born on the first night). Waters Of The Moon, The White Countess, A Kind Of Folly (his own play), Mr. Bolfry, and The Wings Of The Dove, The Winslow Boy and The Confidential Clerk.

In addition to live theatre Owen Holder has appeared in several films. He has also directed several plays, and a major part of his time is now spent script writing for both films and television.

He is married to actress Joyce Cummings and has a son, who is on the way to becoming a television director, and a daughter still at school.

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STEVEN BARNES

Steven Barnes was born in Buckinghamshire in 1944 and educated at the Merchant Taylor's School. He then did a two year stint in advertising but decided to make the stage his career and entered the Central School of Speech and Drama in 1964.

He is a versatile artiste and his stage appearances include principal roles in Caste, Eh? Crucible, Ghosts, Cinderella (Prince Charming), This Story Of Yours, Erb (a musical), Journey's End, Midsummer Night's Dream, The Tempest, Candida and Toad Hall.

He is also well-known on television, having appeared in Z Cars and The Avengers.

His hobbies are mending old clocks, poetry, cooking, driving, antiques and avoiding all sports except water ski-ing.

MARCIA ASHTON

Born in Sheffield she went to school in Sheffield and Derbyshire. She trained at RADA where she taught several years later. On leaving RADA she played Hedwig in *The Wild Duck* and Raina in *Arms And The Man*, both on television. Then straight into the London Arts Theatre production of *Hobson's Choice*. After that came the hard but pleasant grind in rep in various companies around the country. Among her favourite roles was Lily in *Alfie* which she played in London and America. Other favourites were the Nun in *Valmouth* and the original *Cranks* devised by John Cranko.

Between these productions came the twice-weekly soap opera Compact for BBC television playing once again Lily (the tea girl) and straight after this a third Lily in The Rag Trade. Last television show was Upstairs Downstairs and appeared until the beginning of May with Rogers and Starr at the Hampstead Theatre Club in a late night revue.

Married, with two teenage children, neither of whom wish to follow in their mother's footsteps.

No real hobbies due to shortage of time, but she finds gardening a great relaxation which is just as well as nobody else knows how to use the lawnmower. As another relaxation reads quite a lot — almost anything — as it's difficult to garden after a late night show!

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ELEANOR THOMAS

Born in Swansea, Wales, she trained at LAMDA and as a teacher taught speech and drama for two years. She began her professional career with Brian Way's Children's Theatre Company, and has appeared several times on Television for BBC Wales and Harlech. She played Shakespeare's Juliet in Germany; and a selection of parts in Dylan Thomas' Under Milk Wood in Holland and at the Edinburgh Festival. Further Festival appearances include The Hollow Crown; Galsworthy's The Skin Game and Zoe in A Scent Of Flowers. She has also appeared in readings at the Royal Festival Hall with Derek Jacobi and at Swansea Rep where she played Violet in Twelfth Night; Queen Victoria in Portrait Of A Queen; Stella in Street Car Named Desire; Becky Sharp in Vanity Fair and Heloise in Abelard And Heloise.

NANCY SEABROOKE

Nancy Seabrooke trained at RADA. After repertory seasons at Northampton, York and elsewhere, numerous tours, the war years with ENSA, a season at Stratford-on-Avon and stage management for BBC television and ITV, she has concentrated on stage management in the West End. *Crown Matrimonial*, which she stage managed at the Theatre Royal, Haymarket, was her thirty-sixth West End show. She has played parts in the television series *No Hiding Place*, *Maigret*, *Sentimental Agent*, and others.

JEAN HARDWICKE

Jean Hardwicke trained as a ballet dancer with Marie Rambert, but gave it up to do acting when she gained a scholarship for RADA. She is the niece of Sir Cedric Hardwicke and her brother John is now Professor of Pathology at Birmingham and was one of Sir Alexander Fleming's team working on the discovery of Penicillin.

After gaining experience at Northampton, Coventry and other repertory companies, also appearing on BBC television a number of times, she gave up acting for some years to live in Ceylon. After returning to England she resumed her career appearing in numerous London productions including Waltz Of The Toreadors at the Criterion, Girl In My Soup at the Globe, The Killing Of Sister George at the Duke of York's, The Winslow Boy at the New, Butley and Dolls House also at the Criterion.


