

FROM THE THEATRE DIRECTOR

So far this financial year, i.e. from 1st April, we have played to over 30,000 patrons which represents an 80% average capacity. This is the kind of figure we have striven to attain for many years, and the build up has been slow but fortunately sure. Now that we have attained it, we must keep on working so as not to fall back. During the time the Theatre has been building its audience it has also built its high reputation for producing, and is now recognised as one of the leading producing theatres in the country. There have been 84 productions set up here. Of these 34 subsequently toured. Ten productions have transferred to London's West End, three played Canada and one the USA. Currently Separate Tables is at the Apollo Theatre, London, and Hedda Gabler at the Duke of York's, London.

We are now all set to start rehearsals for the new musical Maggie. The director will be Tom Hawkes, designer of sets and costumes Malcolm Pride, lighting designer Nick Chelton, choreographer Sally Gilpin who recently choreographed another new musical Mr. Polly, and Musical Director John White, most recently 'on the road' with Tarantara! Tarantara! the musical story of Gilbert and Sullivan. On 8th August the cast will assemble for first rehearsals, and then its all systems go -- measurements, costumes to make, fittings, properties, accessories, wigs, furnishings in addition to the actual rehearsals, chorus rehearsals, dance routines — everyone flat out with his/her part in the production. There are lighting plots to consider, the sets are being built in the workshops at Billingham, the orchestrations being prepared, the photos and material for publicity, posters, programmes being collected and collated, printing orders placed — and the whole administrative and artistic machinery is in motion. And then, sometimes it seems all too soon, the curtain goes up on 2nd September at 7.30 pm to unveil the result of all the labours. We hope you will be there to appreciate the finished product. Perhaps you will go away humming the tunes, and numbers like 'Charm', 'I Never Laughed In My Life', 'Maggie', 'If I Ever Really Love', 'Do You Remember?', 'Till The End Of Time' and 'Dearest John' will have started a 'life' of their own. Who knows?

Some news of an interesting venture for the Forum Theatre. Next January we are to produce and present an amateur production of a musical written by Stokesley Headmaster, Peter Canwell. It is based on the story of Dr. Barnardo and is called *Carrots* which is the name of the young boy befriended by Barnardo, the boy whose life figures so prominently in the story. It has been presented in a school production and we felt that it might well be a successful show on the Forum stage. The cast will be recruited from this area, and to this end auditions for some parts and chorus of children will be held at Middlesbrough on 6th September, 1977. The musical director will be Peter Tiley from Staindrop Secondary School and choreographer Janice Wilson from Middlesbrough. So if you are talented, can sing, dance and act, write to us for an audition.

As this is the last programme to be produced before September, I will take this opportunity of thanking all patrons for their wonderful support over the past ten months. To see the continual upsurge of interest has greatly heartened all our staff who do work so hard to provide first-class theatre in Cleveland. Our reward is always to see a full house.

Many of you may well be visiting us for the Folklore Festival concerts, but the next time you read a Forum Theatre programme will be September.

We hope you all have a pleasant July and August.

SIMON WILLIAMS (Christopher Isherwood)

Simon Williams is the son of the late Hugh Williams. He appeared at Guildford as Lord Goring in An Ideal Husband last year, and previously in Robert's Wife and Salad Days. Simon started his career in Rep, and his London appearances have included A Friend Indeed, Hay Fever, His, Hers and Theirs, No Sex Please, We're British, The Collector, Gigi and Judge Jeffreys at the Theatre Workshop, Stratford E. He is probably best known on TV for his portrayal of the luckless James Bellamy in Upstairs, Downstairs. Simon's films include The Breaking of Bumbo, Joanna, The Touchables, Blood of Satan's Claw and Sarah, opposite Glenda Jackson. He is married to Belinda Carroll. They have a boy, a girl and a dog and live in Guildford.

DEBORAH GRANT (Sally Bowles)

Deborah Grant trained at the Central School and worked in Rep at Bristol, Bath, Oxford, Liverpool, Leatherhead and Manchester. She has made three West End appearances including a year in the Brian Rix farce Don't Just Lie There — Say Something. Last year she was in Noah and Monsieur Perrichon's Travels at the Chichester Festival Theatre. TV credits include The Power Game, Public Eye, UFO, and Clayhanger, and she played a lead part in the series A Bouquet of Barbed Wire and Another Bouquet, and the young Alexandra in Edward VII.

PAM ST. CLEMENT (Fraulein Schneider)

Pam St. Clement has spent a year with the Royal Shakespeare Company in Hedda Gabler, including a world tour, and she also appeared in the film with Glenda Jackson which was released recently. With the Prospect Company she played Christine in Miss Julie, and has done several productions with Joan Littlewood. She was at the Roundhouse in Troilus and Cressida and has recently been in Amsterdam in Van der Valk. TV credits include Journey to London, Follyfoot, Orson Welles' Great Mysteries, Somerset Maugham Series, Shoulder to Shoulder, Fenn Street and The Onedin Line, and she has appeared twice in Within These Walls, playing the mentally-retarded Marlene in the most recent episode. Her films include Doomwatch and Our Cissey.

RICHARD OWENS (Clive Mortimer)

Richard Owens played Ross in Peter Coe's production of *Macbeth* for Triumph last year. His West End roles include Ernst Ludwig in *Cabaret* at the Palace Theatre, and Paul in *Company* at Her Majesty's. He was in John Clements' production of *St. Joan* at Oxford and in *Dandy Dick* at the Garrick Theatre. His most recent appearances were in *Alphabetical Order* and *The School for Scandal* at Leatherhead. Richard played Colonel Brandon in the TV adaptation of Jane Austen's *Sense and Sensibility*, and his films include *Vampire Circus*.

ERIC CARTE (Fritz Wendell)

Eric Carte trained at the Drama Centre and has appeared in Repertory theatres in Scotland and England, most recently in City Sugar at Coventry. In the West End he appeared in Ian McKellen's Hamlet and Nicol Williamson's Coriolanus with the RSC, and he has toured in Butley and Legend. His films include Zeppelin and The Beast Must Die. In TV he is well known as Geoff in Bouquet of Barbed Wire and its sequel Another Bouquet; he was also in Seven Faces of Women, Intimate Strangers and 'died' in Space 1999 and The New Avengers!

HAZEL BAINBRIDGE (Mrs. Watson-Courtneidge)

Hazel Bainbridge appeared in Guildford in Man and Superman and Hobson's Choice. Since then she has played Mrs. Higgins in Pygmalion at the Thorndike Theatre. West End credits include Jockey Club Stakes, The Gentle Hook and three years in Salad Days at the Vaudeville Theatre. Many TV appearances include the BBC Play of the Month Double Echo, Some Mothers Do 'Ave 'Em, The Wodehouse Playhouse, Walking the Dog in Three Piece Suite with Diana Rigg, and Duchess of Duke Street, to be seen in the autumn. Hazel was born in Yorkshire of theatrical parents, and her daughters Kate O'Mara and Belinda Carroll (who is married to Simon Williams) are continuing the family tradition.

HILARY LABOW (Natalia Landauer)

Hilary Labow trained at the Arts Educational Trust, the Royal Ballet School, and spent one year at LAMDA. She subsequently appeared in Oh! Calcutta!, Grease and Deja Revue. TV includes the Omnibus programme Rodin, Within These Walls and the BBC satirical programme Well, Anyway. Hillary has appeared in the films Stardust, Never Mind the Quality, Feel the Width and The Rocky Horror Picture Show. She has recently been in pantomime, playing the principal boy at Watford.

ROGER REDFARN (Director)

Roger Redfarn trained at Birmingham and worked in Repertory theatres, radio and TV as an actor. He started directing at the Welsh National Theatre where he was production assistant for five years, and went on to the Belgrade Theatre, Coventry, to direct over fifty major productions and many studio experimental works as well as large scale musicals such as West Side Story and The Pajama Game. Roger has worked in Canada, America and South Africa; he has two British Council overseas tours to his credit — The Knack and Entertaining Mr. Sloane — and in 1973 was awarded a Winston Churchill Memorial Fellowship and spent three months visiting theatres in the USA. West End productions include The King and I, Dad's Army and A Bedfull of Foreigners. He recently directed The Loudest Tears in Town, shortly to be seen in London, Absurd Person Singular at the Thorndike Theatre, and The Cabinet Minister, presently on tour for Triumph Theatre Productions.

TERRY PARSONS (Designer)

Terry Parsons was born in Cardiff, and trained at Cardiff College of Art and the Central School of Art in London. He was quickly appointed Head of Design at the Belgrade Theatre, Coventry. After six years there he became a freelance designer. His many shows for Triumph include West End productions of The King and I, The Pleasure of His Company, Dad's Army, and A Bedfull of Foreigners. Terry designs most of Triumph's lavish new pantomimes and Christmas shows. His work overseas includes An Ideal Husband, The Jockey Club Stakes, The Two of Us, and A Bedfull of Foreigners in South Africa. Terry is soon to start work on George and Mildred, starring Yootha Joyce and Brian Murphy, and is currently designing a super summer show for Triumph starring Max Bygraves at the Playhouse Theatre, Bournemouth. He is married and has a delightful daughter Sadie and their latest addition to the family is baby Toby.


